Ecologist scheduled to speak about Oregon Coast prairies Thursday


ASTORIA — Ecologist Doug Glavich will lead an online discussion about Oregon Coast Range prairies Thursday.

The free event will be held online and will take place at 7 p.m. on Facebook Live on the Lewis and Clark National Historical Park Facebook page.

The talk will explore what impacts have led to the loss of this habitat type and ongoing restoration efforts.

Glavich has over 20 years of experience working in the world of ecology. He is an ecologist for the U.S. Forest Service Northwest Oregon ecology group, which covers the Siuslaw, Willamette, and Mount Hood national forests, as well as the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area.

Artists, space sought for SMART Reading mural


ASTORIA — A statewide early literacy nonprofit is seeking a local artist and wall space for an exterior public art mural project in Clatsop County.
