All-league honors for Astoria, Seaside players

Despite tough years in the league standings, the Astoria and Seaside boys soccer teams still managed to place a combined 11 players on the Cowapa all-league team, as voted on by the league's coaches.

In a down season for the Cowapa League, the 4A boys soccer state quarterfinals did not include any teams from the Cowapa, as league champion Valley Catholic and second place Tillamook both lost in the first round of the state playoffs.

Player of the Year honors went to Carter Affolter of Tillamook and Charles Bettger of Valley Catholic; and Goalkeeper of the Year recipients were Valley Catholic's Dhilan Thanik and Seaside senior Riley Wunderlich.

Valley Catholic landed eight players on the all-league team, including two goalkeepers.

Seaside (5-7-1 overall), which lost at state runner-up

Hidden Valley in the play-in round, had six all-league selections, with two juniors and three sophomores joining Wunderlich, one of just two Seaside seniors this season.

Seaside's first team all-league players were juniors Migiel Campos and Anthony Peon, and sophomores Leivis Lopez and Ismael Villasenor.

A young Astoria team, which had just one senior, finished 0-13-1 overall. The Fishermen still reeled in five all-league selections, with one junior, two sophomores and two freshmen.

First team players were junior Cameron Schauermann, sophomore keeper Salvador Wienecke and freshman Walker Steele.

putter to make his game perfect!

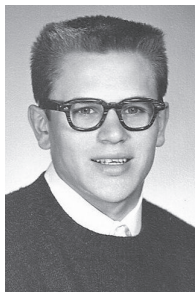
His time spent as a Clatsop Cruise Host was very enjoyable to him, as well, and he loved all animals, especially his kitty, "Samantha."

US opens virus booster shots to all adults

WASHINGTON — The U.S. on Friday opened COVID-19 booster shots to all adults and took the extra step of urging people 50 and older to seek one, aiming to ward off a winter surge as coronavirus cases rise even before millions of Americans travel for the holidays.

Until now, Americans faced a confusing list of who was eligible for a booster that varied by age, their

health and which kind of vaccine they got first. The Food and Drug Administration authorized changes to Pfizer and Moderna boosters to make it easier.

Under the new rules, anyone 18 or older can choose either a Pfizer or Moderna booster six months after their last dose. For anyone who got the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine, the wait already was just two months. And people can mix-and-match boosters from any company.

"We heard loud and clear that people needed something simpler — and this, I think, is simple," FDA vac-

cine chief Dr. Peter Marks said.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention had to agree before the new policy became official late Friday. CDC Director Dr. Rochelle Walensky endorsed a recommendation from her agency's scientific advisers that — in addition to offering all adults a booster — had stressed that people 50 and older should be urged to get one.

"It's a stronger recommendation," said CDC adviser Dr. Matthew Daley of Kaiser Permanente Colorado. "I want to make sure we provide as much protec-

tion as we can."

The CDC also put out a plea for those who had previously qualified but hadn't yet signed up for a booster to quit putting it off — saying older Americans and people with risks such as obesity, diabetes or other health problems should try to get one before the holidays.

The expansion makes tens of millions more Americans eligible for an extra dose of protection.
