Seaside boys top North Marion, 64-52

The Seaside boys basketball team bounced back from a Wednesday loss to Marshfield with a 64-52 nonleague win over North Marion, Friday night at Seaside.

The game was closer than the final score indicated, as the Huskies were within 54-48 late in the fourth quarter, before North Marion started fouling and didn't stop until the Gulls hit six straight free throws, and outscored the Huskies 10-4 in the final minutes.

Seaside's largest lead in the first half came at the end of the first quarter (11-5), matched later at 23-17 following consecutive scores by Cash Corder.

North Marion relied on 3-pointers by Cole Hammack and Dylan Herron, and two scores by Evan Holman that brought the Huskies into a 25-25 tie at halftime.

But no team has been able to stop the Gulls from the 3-point line, where Seaside sank four shots in the third quarter from Ever Sibony, Izzy Jantes, Carson Kawasoe and Corder, helping the Gulls build a 46-38 lead by the end of the quarter.

Sibony led all scorers with 21 points, followed by Corder with 17.

Astoria 60, Warrenton 36

Warrenton held a one-point lead after one quarter, but the rest of the night belonged to Astoria, as the Fishermen outscored the Warriors 47-22 over the final three quarters, for a 60-36 nonleague boys basketball win Saturday at Warrenton.

Colton McMaster had a game-high 22 points for Astoria, with help from teammates Niko Boudreau (13 points) and Owen Williams

(12 points), as the Fishermen improved to 6-6 overall, with league play beginning Wednesday at Banks.

Warrenton's Josh Earls hit three 3-pointers in the first quarter and finished with nine points, along with Dawson Little. The Warriors were playing their second game in two days, coming off a 49-39 loss Friday at Willamina.

Bulldogs 49, Warriors 39

The Warrenton and Willamina boys basketball teams hooked up in a 3-point shooting contest Friday, in a Coastal Range League contest.

The two teams combined to make 14 3-pointers through three quarters, and the Bulldogs outscored the Warriors in the fourth, 13-6, for a 49-39 win.

Warrenton had just one shot attempt from two-point range in the second quarter, relying on a pair of three's from No. 3, Dawson Little, and another trey by Elijah Whitsett for an 18-12 lead.

Willamina answered with back-to-back 3-pointers from Cohen Haller and Austin Carrasco, and took an eventual 25-20 lead in the third quarter on a three by Jacob Hadley.

The Warriors responded with two straight treys from Hordie Bodden Bodden and Little for a 26-25 advantage, but Willamina took the lead for good on two straight triples from Kaleb Cruickshank and Haller.

Little scored 20 points for the Warriors, and Haller had 20 for Willamina.

"He was real tough on us," Warrenton coach Nate McBride said of Haller. The game was "very back and forth. We led as much as they did. They just made more plays down the stretch, and we had to start fouling."

Athletes back in the pool, as Seaside hosts double dual

Swimmers were back in the water last Wednesday, as Seaside hosted a double-dual meet with Astoria and Taft at Sunset Pool.

The Taft boys scored victories over Astoria (103-65) and Seaside (95-71), while the Gulls topped Astoria, 88-70.

On the girls side, Astoria was the big winner, outscoring Taft (74-48) and Seaside (80-46), while the Lady Gulls defeated Taft, 55-51.

Just the second meet for Seaside and the fourth for Astoria, swimmers across the board saw huge time drops in their events.

The Astoria foursome of Brooke O'Connor, Lily Reed, Hannah Daniels and Emelia Cameron opened the day with a win in the girls 200-yard medley relay (2:23.12), just ahead of Seaside (2:26.57).

A junior, Cameron won the 100-yard freestyle in 1:03.30 and took the 100-

yard backstroke (1:15.77), and the same four swimmers won the 200-yard freestyle relay in 2:06.05.

In the boys meet, Seaside's Sam Heroux won the 200-yard individual medley in 2:29.11, ahead of Astoria's Phelan Dopp (2:33.49); Seaside's Masyn McCulloch had the best time (24.35) out of 21 swimmers in the 50-yard freestyle; and McCulloch also won the 100-yard freestyle in 57.82, edging Astoria's Stephen Ero (58.21).

Other wins came from Astoria's 200-yard freestyle relay team of Finn Bizzell, Dopp, Trevor Newman and Ero (1:44.48), and Seaside's Leif Rehnert took first in the 100-yard backstroke (1:09.55).

Astoria hosts dual meets with Tillamook on Thursday and Valley Catholic (Jan. 27), followed by the Cowapa League championships and the District 1 meet, both held next month at the Astoria Aquatic Center.

Seaside snapped a six-game losing skid by scoring a season-high in points Friday night at home, in a 42-39 nonleague girls basketball win over North Marion.

Lilli Taylor poured in a game-high 25 points, and the Gulls needed all of it, as North Marion nearly pulled off an improbable fourth quarter comeback.

Trailing 31-18 after three quarters, the Huskies scored 21 in the fourth, pulling to within 40-37 following a 3-pointer by Laura Cabrero with under a minute remaining.

The Gulls eventually closed it out at the free throw line, where Taylor and Abby Nofield combined to make 5-of-6 in the final minute to clinch the victory, helping Seaside improve to 4-9 overall.

Taylor scored 13 of her points in the third quarter.

Seaside opens Cowapa League play Wednesday at Valley Catholic.

To test? Or not to test? WHEN TO GET A COVID-19 TEST

You've had a known COVID-19 exposure but don't have any symptoms. What's next?

If you were fully vaccinated with Pfizer or Moderna or had their booster within the last 5 months OR you received the initial J&J dose within the past 2 months:

- Testing is recommended at day 5.
- Wear a mask around others for 10 days. No quarantine needed.

If you were fully vaccinated with Pfizer or Moderna more than 5 months ago or have not had their booster within the last 5 months OR you received the initial J&J dose more than 2 months ago:

- Quarantine at home for 5 days.
- Testing is recommended at day 5.
- Continue to wear a mask for another 5 days.

Regardless of vaccination status, if you test positive:

- Isolate at home for 5 days. You must be fever-free for 24 hours without medication before leaving your home.
- If symptoms are resolved or improving, continue to wear a mask for another 5 days.
