Jan later met and married William "Marv" Harrod. Marv adopted Jeff and Gregg in 1962. Jeff spent the rest of his childhood in Warrenton. He felt very fortunate to have grown up in a small town, and make lifelong friends.

He particularly liked spending time at the Dyer house, raiding the refrigerator and playing hoops and cards. He excelled in both sports and academics. He was coached on the basketball team by Bob Cole, who later in life became a good friend.

Jeff graduated from Warrenton High School as class valedictorian in 1972. During summer breaks, Jeff worked as a deckhand on charter boats for Warrenton Deep Sea. He caught the eye of Leonard Prince, president of Electrical Construction Co., and was hired to skipper their company fishing boat. He operated the Ol' Jane out of Hammond until it was sold, due to the economic slowdown.

Randall W. Hunt Astoria April 26, 1951 — Oct. 11, 2021

Randall W. Hunt (aka "Bert") was born April 26, 1951, at St. Mary's Hospital in Astoria, and died on Oct. 11, 2021, at cardiac unit at OHSU. He underwent various 7:45 a.m. at Columbia Memorial Hospital in Astoria.

Born with four major heart defects (Tetralogy of Fallot), Randy had a hard time keeping up with other kids in his hometown of Svensen. But at 16, he underwent open-heart surgery at Oregon Health & Science University Hospital, and suddenly became relatively mobile for the first time in his life.

He had a pretty wild time with friends in Knappa High School, later attending the University of Oregon, Gonzaga University and College Claisop Community with a focus on being a journalist and writer. He loved putting together a newspaper. He kept in touch with friends and family with letters that always brought a good laugh. Randy was determined to have a good life in spite of his heart condition. A voracious reader, he had a nonstop yen for learning, a lifelong love of movies, and a mania for basketball. He was a masterful house painter for 40 years. His wanderlust took him to San Francisco and Portland, where he met his fellow "Erd," Caroline Taylor, in 1991. In 1997, they visited her family in the U.K. Their quirky and hilarious dynamic was a joy to behold. Behind the scenes, they were a world unto themselves. They moved back to Svensen in 2015.

Over the years, Randy's heart began to weaken, and there were many visits to the procedures and the implantation

of three defibrillator-pacemakers. Randy made people feel better by simply walking into a room. He was uniformly described as "authentic," "easy to be with," "a lovely person," "an excellent

man." He could make you laugh till you cried, and was so easy to talk to. Randy wanted more than any-

thing to publish at least one interesting and meaningful book, and he left behind a manuscript that Caroline will finish. "Bert's Box" recounts his experiences growing up in the lower Columbia River valley, his family's history in the area, as well as a history of the area itself.

Utilities to spend millions on upgrades to reduce wildfire ignition risks

Private electric utilities in the Pacific Northwest are planning tens of millions of dollars in upgrades to reduce the risk that their power lines could spark wildfires during extreme weather. Utilities such as Pacific Power, Avista Utilities, Idaho Power, Portland General Electric and Puget Sound Energy are either required to or are voluntarily submitting wildfire mitigation plans.

The 2022 editions are now public. These reports show major spending increases to harden infrastructure, remove trees near power lines and install systems to instantaneously deenergize circuits if a fault is detected during a windstorm. Pacific Power, for example, said it forecasts \$473 million in wildfire protection spending over the next five years. PGE, with a much smaller service territory, budgeted \$32 million in wildfire program operations and capital costs just for this year.

Utilities will eventually seek to recover those costs through customers' monthly bills. Proposed electric rate increases pending before the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission already include some wildfire mitigation costs.

"We define a risk tree as anything dead,

dying or diseased that can strike a power line," David James, wildfire resiliency manager for Spokane-based Avista Utilities, told an oversight hearing of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission on Wednesday. "Year-to-date, we've removed over 4,000 trees — 4,416 trees. That is just incredible."

At the same virtual meeting, executives of Pacific Power and Puget Sound Energy described investments pretty much all major Western utilities are making to both prevent the grid from sparking wildfires and prevent passing fires from taking down electric service. The infrastructure hardening measures include installing covered conductors, relocating power lines and replacing some wooden transmission poles with steel. In rare instances, overhead power lines are being replaced with underground wires, but that is expensive.

In Oregon, the Legislature last year required electric utilities to submit a wildfire mitigation plan annually. In the past week, the Oregon Public Utility Commission approved the 2022 wildfire plans produced by the private utilities it regulates, Pacific Power, PGE and Idaho Power. The latter's approval came with a caveat that Idaho Power must submit additional info to separate costs between its Idaho and Eastern Oregon customer bases.


