Linda was born June 23, 1947, in Astoria, to John and Nellie (Gray) Barker. She met her future husband, Dan Knuth, while he was serving in the U.S. Coast Guard, and they were married on May 1, 1970, in Astoria.

After Dan finished his service, they moved to Dan's home state of Wisconsin, and eventually settled in Nekoosa, where they made their home and raised their daughters, Vicki and Michelle.

Linda and Dan were blessed with 50 years of marriage. Dan passed away on Aug. 25, 2020.

Linda worked hard from a young age when she took on her first job, delivering The Daily Astorian newspaper so she could buy her first horse, "Smokey." She also worked as a resident advisor for the Tongue Point Job Corps Center in Astoria prior to moving with Dan to Wisconsin.

After making their home in Wisconsin, Linda devoted her time to raising her girls. She was a very active mom, volunteering as a 4-H leader for the Wittenberg Workers 4-H group and leading the effort to remove asbestos from the Nekoosa area schools.

Fueled by her passion for assisting the elderly and those with special needs, Linda later returned to the workforce as a caregiver at Bridgewood and other area facilities.

She was active in the community: leading activities at area nursing homes, helping people with their taxes, volunteering with the U.S. Census Bureau and doing

other volunteer work with special needs and elderly people throughout the community.

Linda always put the needs of others before her own. She loved to cook, and was famous for her baked beans and "ugly bread." She loved camping, and also enjoyed crafting. A part of Linda's heart was always in Oregon. She cherished her role as "big sister" and would return to her hometown as often as possible to get her "ocean fix" or take in a trolley ride.

Greg was one of Jehovah's Witnesses for

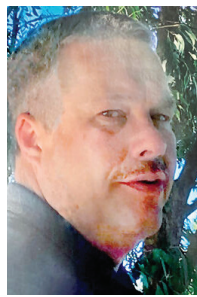

Marcene (Marcy) Lou Gillie passed away unexpectedly on May 26, 2022, at age 80. She was a loving wife and mother who looked for ways to help those around her.

She never let anyone sit alone for long when they needed company, and quickly turned strangers into friends. She loved both flowers and giving them away.

Marcy was born on Feb. 22, 1942, in Battle Creek, Michigan, to Milburn Mathias Haughey and Mary Lou (Burroughs) Haughey. She is survived by her sisters, Suzanne (Haughey) McGee, and her partner, Bill Hardage, and Toby Eileen Haughey, and her wife, Lynn Rich.

Marcy grew up and completed high school in Battle Creek. Afterwards, she decided a change of scenery was in order, and moved to Fairbanks, Alaska. In Fairbanks, she worked as a switchboard operator, which allowed her to meet her future husband, Allen Robert Gillie, who worked for IBM.

They married in Fairbanks in 1965, and moved to Anchorage, where their daughter, Janna Lee, was born in 1967. They moved to Juneau with IBM in 1969, where their daughter, Liese Marie, was born.

Marcy taught swimming and worked for the Juneau School District for over 25 years, assisting children learning to read. She cared deeply about justice and equal

access to education for all children and their families.

She was involved with the Alaska Native Sisterhood in Juneau, and deeply valued the relationships she made there.

She spent her last 25 years in Alaska commercial fishing with her husband on their power troller, Circe, bought after his retirement from IBM.

After fishing, they moved to Astoria, where she became involved in serving at the Svensen Grange senior meal site.

Marcy was always involved in local church ministry, frequently singing in the choir, welcoming newcomers and helping others. She and her husband spent over 40 years worshipping and serving at Chapel by the Lake Church in Juneau before moving to Oregon.

She is survived by her husband of 57 years, Allen Gillie; daughters, Janna Lee Smith, and her husband, David, and Liese Gillie Mead, and her husband, Rob; grandchildren, Brandin Smith, Jacob Smith, Nicholas Mead, Zachary Mead, Faith (Smith) Kyme, Sara (Smith) Peterson, Les Mead, Jayden Mead and Bailey Mead; and five great-grandchildren; as well as numerous well-loved friends and relatives.

Poyer golf tourney raises money for local schools

The winner last weekend was Clatsop County, with a big assist from Jordan Poyer.

The Astoria graduate and All-Pro safety for the Buffalo Bills held his summer football camp on Saturday at CMH Field, and on Monday hosted his second annual JP Open golf tournament at the Astoria Golf & Country Club.

Along with money raised from the camp and the golf tournament — which included an auction after the tournament — the Jordan Poyer Foundation raised thousands of dollars for local high school athletic programs.

One item at the auction — a ticket for two

to the Bills' home opener against Tennessee — sold for \$40,000.

The auction included autographed helmets, cleats and jerseys, along with donated gifts.

And helping draw the spectators for the golf tournament was Poyer's fellow safety with the Bills, Micah Hyde.

Poyer and Hyde are considered by many as the top safety tandem in the NFL.

Earlier this year, Poyer contributed \$10,000 through his foundation and donated an autographed jersey and helmet that raised \$14,000 for the Columbia Memorial Hospital Foundation for the hospital's upcoming expansion project.

McMaster competes in national meet

Recent Astoria High School graduate Colton McMaster was in Eugene last weekend, competing in the annual Nike Outdoor Nationals.

Held at Hayward Field, the four-day event was the 31st outdoor high school national championship, showcasing the best high school track and field athletes in the United States.

Fresh off his state titles in the discus and shot put, McMaster competed in the same

two events in the nationals meet, against the best prep throwers in the country.

McMaster had a toss of 57 feet, 8½ inches on his second throw in the boys shot put on Sunday, a mark good enough for 11th place out of 24 throwers. The winning mark was a 67-3½, by Zane Forist of Carson City, Michigan.

Later in the day, McMaster had a throw of 159-1 on his second throw in the discus to take 20th out of 28 competitors. Jeremiah Nubbe of Rainier, Washington, won the event with a throw of 200-1.
