Opening round matches set for Coast Invitational

The 2022 Oregon Coast Invitational is underway, as Oregon's second-oldest tournament held qualifying rounds Saturday and Sunday, with Day 1 of match play taking place Monday.

Action in the annual matchplay tournament continues all week at the Astoria Golf & Country Club.

The Grand Champions divi-

sion will crown a new winner this year, as defending champion Jon Holzgang of Columbia Edgewater will miss the 2022 tournament.

In Grand Champions qualifying Saturday, David Berlant of the Astoria Golf & Country Club shot a three-under par 69 to take medalist honors, with Jeff Canessa, Matt Elmes, Harrison Moir and Rex Puterbaugh all tied for second at 71.

The Women's 2021 champion

is four-time OCI winner Cappy Mack, who returns to battle 15 other competitors including Charisse Spada, Sunday's medalist with an 82, a four-stroke victory over Kate Sturgell and Jennifer Piper, both at 86.

Joe Schulte of the Astoria Golf & Country Club was medalist in the Junior/Seniors division, carding a one-under par 71 Saturday, well ahead of Brad Nantz (74) and Eric Larson (75).

In the men's Seniors division, Mark Adams of Riverside Golf captured medalist honors in Sunday's qualifying with a 74, edging four golfers at 75. Bill Winter of Columbia Edgewater is the defending Seniors champion.

In the women's Seniors category, Terry Mattson of Pumpkin Ridge took medalist honors in qualifying with an 83. The field of 32 includes last year's defending champion, Cathi Barta.

Barbara Ann Campbell Astoria Oct. 21, 1936 — June 1, 2022

Barbara Ann Campbell was born in Portland on Oct. 21, 1936, to Izora Wooster and Judd Jarvis. Her mother later remarried, and Barbara took the maiden name of

her adoptive father, Gene Espey.

Barbara graduated from The Dalles High School in 1954, and attended the University of Oregon, graduating with a bachelor of science degree in nursing in 1959.

Barbara married Glen Engbretson in 1958. They had three sons together, raising them in the early years on what is now the elk refuge in Jewell.

After selling the farm in 1969,

the family embarked on an adventure in the Peace Corps, living in a village in Iran, where Barbara volunteered in the local clinic. It was common to find a rabbit on their doorstep in gratitude from the local doctor.

After the family returned from Iran, Barbara continued her career as a public health nurse, working as a school nurse and for the Clatsop County Public Health Department for over 20 years. She was affectionately known as Mrs. Eng by "her" students.

Passionate about women's and children's health, Barbara furthered her education at the University of Washington, and continued her career as a certified pediatric nurse practitioner.

Her husband, Glen Engbretson died, in 1982

In her 40s, Barbara began whitewater rafting. She enjoyed showing her skills on Class 4 and Class 5 rapids. She also enjoyed bowling, camping and traveling.

In the early 1990s, Barbara joined her longtime friend and co-worker from county health, Winnifred Olson, in Saudi Arabia to work at King Faisal's hospital in women's health.



Barbara returned and married her longtime partner, Eugene "Luke" Lukosyck, in 1994. She cared for him at home during his battle with cancer. He passed shortly thereafter.

Prior to retirement, Barbara's distinguished career in health care spanned over 40 years.

Barbara loved taking her grandchildren along for the ride on all sorts of adventures, and those are memories they treasure.

Barbara volunteered with many organizations, including the Astoria-Warrenton Area Chamber of Commerce, Astoria Riverfront Trol-

ley and, more recently, the Columbia River Maritime Museum. She was a past member of the American Association of University Women, promoting educational opportunities for women and girls.

Barbara married Jim Campbell in 2002. They built a home in Svensen, where Barbara lived out her retirement, and Jim lovingly cared for her until her battle with Alzheimer's required additional care.

Jim survives. Her son, Brian Engbretson, preceded her in death in 2020.

Barbara is also survived by her two sons, Vincent (Marlyce) Engbretson and Steven (Linda) Engbretson; her grandchildren, both biological and "adopted," Jacob Engbretson, Madison Engbretson, Andrew Litwin, Chelsea Christiansen, John Ewald and Joanna Ewald; and two great-grandchildren, Adelyn Litwin and Keoni Ewald.

Barbara's was a life well lived.

that's affecting cities across the nation, the mayor of Portland has issued a new emergency declaration with the goal of reducing gun killings by at least 10% over the next two years.

The initiative directs \$2.4 million to community groups and prevention efforts.

"Emergency declarations can get results the status quo cannot," Wheeler said Thursday during a briefing at City Hall. "We will not stop until the gun violence stops."

The number of shootings in Oregon's biggest city soared above 670 in the first half of 2022 — ahead of the pace for the same period last year.

Guns have been fueling a surge of deadly violence in Portland in a trend that's been playing out across the U.S. Firearm homicide rates nationwide jumped 35% between 2019 and 2020, the highest rate in more than 25 years, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

In the face of growing violence, many cities are now trying to navigate how to maintain public safety while also addressing the calls to reform and "defund" the police sparked by George Floyd's murder, as racial justice activists seek to have police budgets reallocated to other social services.

Portland, which was roiled by near-nightly Black Lives Matter protests for months in 2020, cut the city's police budget by \$15 million that year. But in November it reversed course, funneling \$5.2 million back to the police department as homicides skyrocketed.

At the briefing, Portland Police Chief Chuck Lovell announced that 16 new police officers were sworn in on Thursday in what he described as the "largest new hire event we've had in a very, very long time." The officers are part of the 300 additional police

bureau staff the city aims to hire over the next three years.

But despite the recent recruits and funding bumps, Lovell said personnel shortages are hampering his department's ability to fight crime.

"It's one of our high priorities to bring the staffing level at the bureau back up," Lovell said. "We are working as hard as we can to solve these cases."

Signaling a shift away from the city's recent cuts to its police budget in 2020, Wheeler said he plans on increasing the department's funds. "As long as this crisis exists, there will be funding," he said.

The initiative aims to enhance and centralize cooperation between law enforcement and community groups with the goal of increasing outreach to individuals at risk of being involved in gun violence.

Wheeler's emergency declaration came in response to a report released by the Portland Police Bureau and the California Partnership for Safe Communities, a nonprofit that advises cities on reducing gun violence. The report found that last year Portland had a homicide rate of 13.5 per 100,000 people, roughly double the nationwide rate.

The number of homicides in Portland surpassed more populous cities like San Francisco and Boston. The Oregon city had twice as many slayings compared to its larger Pacific Northwest neighbor Seattle.

Joe met the love of his life, Carolyn Heinze, in Hastings, Nebraska. They shared a similar background, both coming from pioneer preacher families. They were wed in 1954, eventually settling in Maple Valley, Washington, where they raised their children, Joni and Michael.

When Joe wasn't spreading "the word," under his father's tutelage he became a skilled carpenter and built houses - ultimately building Carolyn's dream home, a passion they shared together.

Joseph enjoyed playing the piano, reading, driving British cars and phone calls with his siblings. He was the patriarch, very much revered, respected and loved. His life was dedicated to spreading the gospel and preaching with authority on revival; never faltering, and always a grand example to his family.

Joseph was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Carolyn, and brothers, David and Clayton.

He is survived by his daughter, Joni (Bruce Campbell); son, Michael (Rebecca); grandchildren, Heidi, Adam, Spencer, Beau and Paris; brothers, Daniel and Sam; sister, Esther; and six great-grandchildren.

A graveside service will be held at 3 p.m. Friday at Ocean View Cemetery, 575 S.W. 18th St. in Warrenton.
