COUNCIL PASSES ON IMPORTANT MATTERS

At the regular meeting of the Common Council Monday the ordinance providing for the bond issue was finally passed with an amendment introduced by Councilman Hall making the interest rate 5 instead of 5 1/2 per cent. The amendment was unanimously concurred in by the other members of council. The date for opening bids is February 15th.

The report on the estimates for the sewer in District No. 4 was accepted and a recommendation that the sewer be constructed in accordance with the same, was passed.

A bond from W. G. Aldred in connection with his contract to macadamize 12th street was accepted. The bond is for \$8,000 and the contract for \$10,000.
