Whereas, The long, weary, but victorious march of another soldier is over, and we, with halting step, broken ranks and saddened hearts,

resume the duties of our vanishing army; therefore be it

Resolved, That in the death of Oscar L. Stranahan, whose name stands first upon our roster as a charter member of Canby Post, we have lost a true and tried comrade, whose record in the Fifth Minnesota Infantry and the U. S. Signal Corps is attested by wounds received in action at the battles of Iuka and Charin, and by his devotion to the work of our order, as shown by his continued service in all the official duties of the Post; that the city and

county of Hood River has lost an eminent citizen and worthy builder of its progressive spirit, and that we can only bow our heads in deepest sympathy for his bereaved widow and sorrowing children, whose only comfort is the incense of pleasant memories and the knowledge that he is in the care of the Great Commander.
