IRRIGATION DISTRICT BOND ELECTION

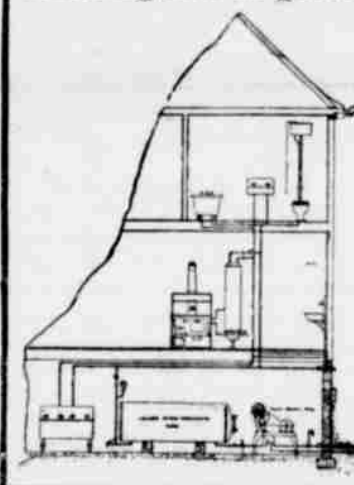
A special election for the voting of bonds has been called by the directors of the Hood River Irrigation District, to be held February 26. It is proposed to issue bonds in a sum not to exceed \$70,000. This district has not in the past sufficient water

and with the funds it is proposed to raise the ditches and flumes will be completed to tap the North and South Greenpoint creeks which, according to engineers' reports will give them an ample supply. It is estimated that the contemplated improvements and extensions will cost about \$45,000.
