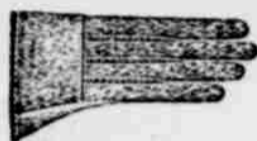

Missionary From India

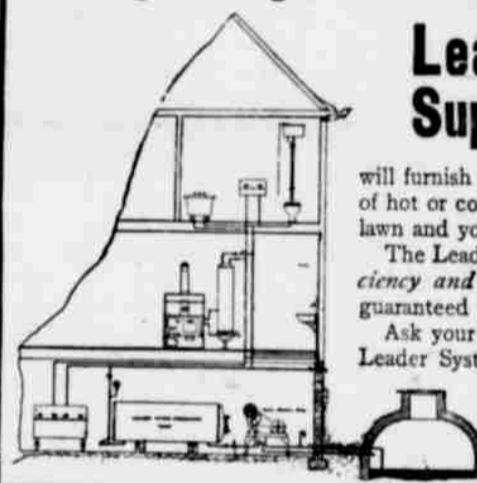
