Died

Edward A. Cushman

Edward A. Cushman, a resident of Odell, died at his home there Sunday morning, aged 78 years. The funeral was held at 10 o'clock a. m. Monday at the house, services being conducted by Rev. Troy Shelley. Interment was in Idlewild cemetery where burial service was performed by the Masonic lodge.

Edward A. Cushman was born July 17, 1832, in Sumner, Me. When he was two years of age his father moved to Sherman, Me., where he grew to manhood and married Eliza E. Sides. To this union was born four children, only one of whom is living, Mrs. Emily Bishop, of Goble, Ore. In 1880 he married Florence N. Young and moved to Oregon. As the result of this marriage three children were born, two of whom are living, Ned and Carrie Cushman, who reside at Hood River. One son, Otis, was drowned July 14, 1906. He resided in Columbia county, Ore., until June, 1903, when he came to Hood River, where he lived until his death. In 1861 he enlisted in the war of the rebellion, Co. B, 8th Maine Infantry, and was discharged for disability.

ty at Hilton Head, S. C., May 9, 1863. He re-enlisted in December, 1863, in Co. M, 2d Maine cavalry, and was appointed corporal June 18, 1864, and promoted to sergeant Oct. 1, 1864. Mr. Cushman was wounded at Marianna, Fla., Sept. 27, 1864, discharged at Augusta, Me., July 12, 1865.

George H. Allen

George H. Allen, who came to Hood River about a year ago and purchased land in the upper valley, died at Overlook hospital at Summit, N. J., Sunday, February 20th. Mr. Allen, accompanied by his wife, went east last fall to spend the winter, and had been staying with his brother. Word of his death was received here by his daughter, Miss May Allen, who had just returned to this city from Corvallis, where she had been attending the winter horticultural course. The announcement was a great shock to Miss Allen, as well as the many friends of the family here, as Mr. Allen was thought to be in his usual health.

Mrs. Elizabeth Shaw

Mrs. Elizabeth Shaw, wife of Dr. A. M. Shaw, died early Thursday morning after suffering for some time with an attack of nervous prostration. While her condition was

serious, her death was unexpected and came as a severe shock to her husband and many friends. Mrs. Shaw, who was 56 years old, was born in Indiana, April 14, 1854. She had lived at Hood River for many years and had a wide circle of friends here.

Accompanied by Dr. Shaw, the body of Mrs. Shaw left here Friday evening for Indiana, where it will be interred in the family burial place.

OBITUARY

Mrs. A. P. Morse

The following taken from Logan County News of Winona, Kan., gives an interesting obituary on the death of Mrs. A. P. Morse, mother of L. E. Morse and C. L. Morse of Hood River: "Another pioneer is gone. One by one, those who have paved the way for the present, who were leaders in the western movement, drop out of life's work and leave their places to be filled by other and younger workers."

"Annabel P. Belding was born in Ashfield, Mass., June 8th, 1829, and moved to Ottisville, Iowa county, Mich. in 1840, at that time only a wilderness."

"What education she received was before she left Massachusetts, but by much reading she kept pace with the advancement of the age. "At the age of 19, on Feb. 4th, 1848, she was united in marriage to Chas. F. Morse at the home of her parents in Ottisville, Mich. To this union were born eight children, six boys and two girls, all born at their home in Michigan."

"Four died while young, the other four survive her. They are Chas. L. Lewis, E. of Hood River, Ore., Fred B. of Ness City, Kans., and Mrs. Nellie D. Raines, of Winona, Kans., who attended her mother faithfully during her last short illness. Two brothers, also, survive Mrs. Morse, Tiberius Belding of Minneapolis, Minn., and Wait Belding of Winona, Kansas. This brother, "Uncle Wait" to all who know him, is an invalid, for whom Mrs. Morse sacrificed much and who will mourn her loss most deeply."

"Besides these close relatives there remain ten grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, many other relatives and a host of friends to mourn the death of dear old Grandma Morse. "In 1876 the family moved to Milo, Lincoln county, Kans., where her husband died on July 12th, 1884. In 1887 she moved to her last home in Logan county, where she resided

until her death.

"Grandma Morse had been a pioneer all her life. She was educated in the good old days when teachers taught, when pupils were trained to study, and when schools were real seminaries—places of learning—not flitting places, where riot and ignorance prevail, as is true of too many of our present day schools. She learned to be a scholar, a lady, a true noble woman in her school days, something too few acquire in schools of today, and in her reading and travels (for she had been from ocean to ocean, and had seen many of the most interesting places in America) she was able to extract learning, culture and pleasure. Well may the girls of today emulate the example of this estimable lady of the 'Old School.'"

"In religious belief she was a spiritualist; she believed in the immortality of the soul, and the life everlasting. Her motto was the Golden Rule. 'Do unto others as you would that others should do unto you.' None followed this rule better than did Mrs. Morse. She was a faithful and obedient daughter, a true and loyal wife, and to her children a most tender, loving and devoted mother—the best of mothers was she to her children. She was laid to rest in Lincoln county, beside her husband."

IRRIGATION DISTRICT VOTES BOND ISSUE

With scarcely a dissenting vote the taxpayers in the Hood River Irrigation District voted Saturday to bond for an additional \$70,000, if necessary to finish the system which will water that district. It is not expected that it will take more than \$45,000 of this amount to complete the system. The additional amount was voted in case unforeseen obstacles are found in distributing the water. It is estimated that the new ditch will irrigate \$2,000,000 worth of orchard land when complete, so that the amount of bonds to be issued against it is a comparatively small sum with a benefit to be derived many times over the amount.
