S. P. & S. MEN VISIT HUSUMITES

Husum, May 10—Field Engineer Balhizer, who made the survey of the Columbia River and Mt. Adams Railroad up the White Salmon River last fall, was here Saturday in the interest of the proposed line. He was accompanied by a representative of the S. P. & S., and several water power sites were investigated between this point and the Trout Lake region. They also interviewed ranchers where right of way is yet to be secured, leaving the general impression that the railroad company expects to commence operations within a short time.

A bungalow of modern architecture and large dimensions is to be erected in this vicinity by H. F. Pabst of the Portland Gas Co. The structure will be erected on the 40-acre orchard tract recently purchased by Mr. Pabst from C. Bowman for \$20,000.

Developing a successful fruit crop every year for the past 20 years is the record of Charles Neal, living in central Kileklat county. Peaches were raised on the same ranch, which is located in a high altitude, for 18 consecutive years.

Several ranchers in eastern Kileklat county complain of damage done to their wheat fields by flocks of geese making that section their feeding grounds during their northern flight. The county commissioners in session at the county seat designated the Goldendale Sentinel as the official paper for the year 1910.

BRUNER ORCHARD SELLS FOR \$36,000

Myron T. Bruner sold his six year old orchard on the east side last week to Edward L. McLain of Greenfield, Ohio, for \$36,000. The property consists of 19 1/2 acres and is one of the best orchards in the valley.

WENT TO SLEEP HAD LEG CRUSHED

Lyle, May 9—While stealing a ride on the steps of an observation car on the S. P. & S. Railroad near Roosevelt Saturday, Donald F. Jensen, a stone cutter, 27 years old, fell asleep with the result that his dangling legs caused him to be jerked off and receive a badly crushed leg. He was found by the train crew and brought to Lyle and later removed to the Goldendale hospital. It is hoped to save his leg although badly splintered.

SOME GOOD DESSERTS.

Half a Dozen Recipes For Good Finishes For Dinners.
Malta Cake.—Three eggs, their weight in butter, sugar and flour, one teaspoonful of baking powder, the grated rind of one orange. Beat the butter to a cream with a fork, then add the sugar, eggs, flour and orange. Bake about three-quarters of an hour.
Rice Cake.—Four ounces of ground rice, four ounces of flour, four ounces of castor sugar, four ounces of butter, four ounces of glace cherries, four ounces of ground almonds, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, three eggs and a little milk. Bake one hour and a half in a moderate oven.
Lemon Sirup.—Two pounds of loaf sugar, two pints of water, one ounce of citric acid, half a dram of essence of lemon. Boil the water and sugar together for a quarter of an hour, beat citric acid to a powder and mix with the essence of lemon. Add these to the sirup when cold, mix well and bottle for use.
Tapioca Jelly.—Wash a teacupful of tapioca and set in stewpan with one pint and a half of boiling water. Cook slowly for an hour or until transparent, stirring frequently, then add three ounces of lump sugar and half a pound of red currant or raspberry jelly. Stir till all is thoroughly dissolved and set in a glass dish. Serve cold with whipped cream piled on top.
Cabinet Pudding.—Two cupfuls of breadcrumbs, half a cupful of raisins and currants, one cupful of milk, one tablespoonful of sugar, one egg and a pinch of salt. Make a custard by beating egg, milk, sugar and salt together. Put breadcrumbs and fruit in alternate layers in a well buttered mold and pour in custard. Steam for half an hour. Serve with lemon sauce or milk.
Rice Cheese Cakes.—Line patty tins with a short crust rolled thinly, rub two ounces of butter into a cupful of ground rice, add half a cupful of castor sugar and half a teaspoonful of baking powder, mix with two well beaten eggs, half fill the lined patty tins with the mixture and bake in a moderate oven. If liked a teaspoonful of jam may be placed in the tin before the rice mixture is put in.
