**NEW YORK EXPECTS GOOD APPLE CROP**

The old apple deal is winding up better than expected earlier in the season, says the Produce News. The cool weather this spring enabled many holders to get out whole and some have been able to make a fair profit. Up-state apples are held by a few and the amount is limited. The demand is still moderate and the remaining light stocks are going out at steady to firm prices. Baldwins, Kings and Greenings are bringing \$3.50 @ \$4.50, which are about the highest prices of the season. Greenings are almost gone, the few remaining being of a mediocre quality.

With the old apple deal nearing its finish, interest centers in prospects for the new crop. According to dealers and growers who have already made an examination of conditions in the western New York apple belt, there is no reason for believing that the crop will not be a good one. Every two years apples in this part of the state usually yield a large crop. Last year the crop was below the average in quality, and for this reason operators say that it would not be surprising to see a good crop this year. The trees came through the severe winter in excellent shape, and with favorable weather in the spring blossomed full. No damage was done by frost in this locality, although in some of the exposed sections some injury was reported following the last freeze early in the month. The absence of blossoms was seen only in such orchards as were damaged or received no care, or in specific orchards where the trees bore heavily last year. Taken as a whole, the blossom in Western New York is good.

A prominent dealer who makes a business of buying and selling the fruit products of Western New York gave the representative of The News the following statement of present conditions: "With the exception of pears, we have never had such a blossoming of fruit trees in western New York as this season. Pears did not blossom full and did not fertilize. Therefore it seems as if they will be a light crop. My reports all point to a smaller crop of pears, especially Bartlett's, which did not fertilize scarcely at all.

"Apples promise a good crop on all varieties. Baldwins, Kings, Greenings, Spys, Twenty-ounce and other kinds ought to do as well, or better than the crops of last year. There were plenty of apples of all kinds here last season but the quality was poor. From my reports I think the yield will be as large as last year. The quality will depend entirely on growing conditions. The blossom has been full and fertilization good.

"Weather conditions so far have been favorable. What is most to be feared in the blossom time is heavy rain and excessive heat. So far there has been neither. Rains have been light and the weather has been cool, with only a few warm days. Cool weather like we have been having the last two weeks will be fine for the crop, because it will allow the blossom to fertilize better on account of the extra time given during its blossoming period."

**"OREGONIAN" LIMITED NEW NORTH BANK TRAIN**

The Great Northern's new through train between Portland and St. Paul to be known as the "Oregonian" is to be put in service June 12, according to an announcement made Friday by H. A. Jackson, the Portland general agent of the road. This is a week earlier than the inauguration of the new service had been expected. The "Oregonian" leaves Portland at 11 a. m. daily via the North Bank, arriving in Spokane at 10:30 p. m., or making the run to the Inland City in 11 hours and 30 minutes. West-bound the train will leave Spokane at 7:30 p. m. and arrive in Portland at 7 a. m. It will be a solid through train between Portland and the Minnesota capitol.

On the same date train No. 4 of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle will begin carrying standard and tourist sleepers which will be attached to the Oriental Limited of the Great Northern at Spokane and carried through to Chicago. Through cars from Chicago will be transferred from the Oriental Limited at Spokane and brought through to Portland on train No. 1 of the S. P. & S. This will give the Great Northern a double daily train service out of Portland direct to the east. Beginning on June 5 the trains No. 1 and 4 of the North Bank route will use the Great Northern depot out of Spokane instead of the Northern Pacific as heretofore, and the "Oregonian" will of course also use the Great Northern station.

**Labor Day at O. A. C.**

On Friday, May 27th, every member of the college community, from the oldest and most learned pedagogue to the youngest and most verdent freshman, worked on the campus grading ground, mowing grass and cutting down trees, for it was College Labor Day at the Oregon Agricultural College. Seven hundred men, including the members of the faculty, responded to roll call at eight o'clock in the morning and immediately took up the work of improving and beautifying the campus, which continued until five o'clock in the afternoon. Many trees were cut down, many yards of dirt moved and much rubbish cleaned away. No partiality was shown in the division of labor; professor and students worked at the same tasks. Toward the end of the day the campus had indeed witnessed a very marked change and the work which had all been previously arranged was carried out to the letter.
