SKEEING IN THE ALPS.

Picturesque Sport on the Order of "Follow Your Leader."
The skeeing clubs form one of the most picturesque sights to be seen in the Alps in winter. With their bright colored blanket suits, tasseled caps or tam-o'-shanters and huge white mitts, they go through the snow covered woodlands across the white mountain slopes usually in single file, perhaps fifty skidding along after the leader in true Norwegian fashion. Indeed, it is a variety of the old game of "follow your leader," for what he does the others are expected to do. So if he comes to a ledge and jumps off all are supposed to leap.
But jumping with the skees is not so easy as it looks, and the end is often burial in the snow bank, for unless one is very sure of his footing the long, narrow wooden slats will twist or turn without warning, and over you go. With the skee one can go over hard snow at a very rapid rate, but when he strikes a patch of the newly fallen snow it is a case of slow to be sure, for any minute the bottom may sink away with him.
