COUNTY POLITICIANS DISCUSS CANDIDATES

The political pot has commenced to boil during the past few days and friends of candidates are getting busy. So far no announcements have been made by the candidates themselves, with the exception of S. W. Stark for circuit judge, although some of them are understood to be in the field.

It is stated that friends of J. P. Lucas are urging him to become a candidate for county clerk, as are also those of Henry Howe of the Waucoma Abstract Company and F. H. Isenberg. Apparently no candidate for the office of sheriff has loomed up. For assessor it is understood that both George Dimmick of Mount Hood and Jesse Wickham may enter the field.

Much to the regret of his many friends County Judge Derby is said to have declined to serve again and it is stated that M. M. Hill doesn't look on another term as county commissioner with much favor, although asked by a number to do so. As yet R. J. McIsaac, the other member of the county court, has not announced his decision in the matter. Friends of C. H. Stranahan are urging him to become a candidate for commissioner, but so far have not persuaded him to come through. G. D. Woodworth is also mentioned by a number as a candidate for commissioner.

J. L. Henderson, it is understood, will be a candidate for county surveyor, but wants it known that he will not run on the assembly ticket. It is expected that other candidates will be named during the next few days and that the county campaign will be a lively one.

PARK GRANGE 4TH WILL BE HUMMER

Park grange will commence its big celebration to whoop things up on the Fourth at 9 a. m., when a grand automobile parade will form in town and proceed to Grange Park. The procession will be headed by Major F. C. Brosius as grand marshal of the day, and will be met on the road to the park by the West Side Amateur Band. Hon. M. P. Isenberg will be president of the day.

An address of welcome will be delivered at the park at 10 a. m. by Worthy Master of the Grange G. H. Robbins. Following this will be the reading of the Declaration of Independence by Arthur Moses. Patriotic addresses will also be made by Hon. A. A. Payne and Attorney E. C. Smith.

A big picnic dinner will be served at 12 o'clock, such as only the Belmont ladies can provide. This will be followed by a concert by the band and an address "Why we Celebrate" by A. C. Staten and vocal music by J. C. Staten and others.

A grand ball will be held in the evening followed by supper. Refreshments will be served all day and all night, and the committee promises something doing all the time.

The young ladies of the Congregational church will give an ice cream and sherbert social Thursday evening June 30th, for the benefit of the Girls' Club. The social will be held on the church grounds and the band will furnish music.
