ORCHARD PROPERTY IN RECEIVER'S HANDS

Judge Bean last week agreed to appoint as receiver C. H. Sproat of Hood River to take charge of a 30-acre apple orchard that formerly belonged to Oscar Vanderbilt. A suit affecting recent sale of this orchard to Minette Bishop and Joseph Thullen is now pending in the federal court, and both sides agree that it is necessary to have some one to pick this year's apple crop and attend to urgent details. Both sides announced that Mr. Sproat was an acceptable person to fill the office of receiver and the court announced that a bond of \$5000 would be required of him, unless some presentation is later made showing that change of this amount would be necessary. F. V. Holman of Portland appeared for the Thullen interests, while A. J. Derby of Hood River who was admitted to practice before the federal bar, appeared for Mr. Vanderbilt. It is stated that a receiver is appointed owing to difference between Mr. Vanderbilt and Mrs. Bishop and Thullen involving money transactions and conditions under which the property was sold.

SAYS REPUBLICANS FOR CORPORATIONS

Sam Stark, who was in Portland Wednesday, after hobnobbing with the assembly delegates gave out the following interview to the Journal:

"In Hood River county," said Samuel W. Stark, "the assembly named a full ticket for the county and with the exception of county judge a full primary ticket is out. As there are only about 25 per cent of the Republicans for the assembly the primary ticket will undoubtedly prevail."

"I am a candidate for the nomination of circuit judge in the seventh district on the Republican ticket, but would prefer defeat than to be indorsed by the assembly, which, to my mind, is nothing more than the old corporation machine and is under stronger control by corporations now than ever before, because very few people except those influenced by corporations are taking any part in the assembly. While I have no knowledge of any opposition and could have probably been indorsed by the assembly, if I had lined up for the corporations, instead I requested the assembly delegates to leave me out."

MRS. E. B. WOOD

The funeral of the late Mrs. E. B. Wood, who died at Portland last Wednesday, was held from the Lutheran church at The Dalles Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the services being conducted by the Rev. M. E. Boulton.

Dalles December 11, 1881, being 28 years old. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis J. Davenport, pioneers of The Dalles and Wasco county. Miss Davenport was married August 10, 1903 to Edwin B. Wood, the well known O. R. & N. detective, who was chief of police of The Dalles and deputy sheriff for Wasco county for several years. Peritonitis caused the death of Mrs. Wood at her Portland home, to which the family moved about three years ago.

She is survived by her husband, two children, Gertrude aged 6, and Helen aged 4, five sisters and three brothers, Mrs. P. H. Robinson and Mrs. Ray Sturgess of Portland, Mrs. F. S. Gunning and Miss Alice Davenport of The Dalles, Mrs. Harry Kemp of Hood River, George L. and Chas. H. Davenport of Portland and John T. Davenport of Mosier.
