INTEREST CONTINUES
IN COUNTY POLITICS

County politics has continued to occupy a share of the public interest during the week. Several new candidates have announced their intention to run for office, while others have declined to accept the nominations made by the county assembly. The refusal of J. P. Lucas to become a candidate for assessor has made it necessary for the Republican County Central Committee to select another candidate and the nomination has been tendered to Henry Howe, who is now at Walla Walla and who is expected to accept. Dr. Brosius has also refused to become a candidate for county coroner, making it necessary to secure a some one for this office. So far there is no aspirant so the nomination is still open.

W. E. Hanson deputy county clerk and who has filled this position very acceptably for more than a year, announces that he will be a candidate before the primaries for the Republican nomination for county clerk. Mr. Hanson has made many friends while in the clerk's office who believe that his services deserve recognition. Another candidate who will go before the voters at the primaries is Jasper Wickham who desires the Republican nomination for assessor. For several years Mr. Wickham has been deputy assessor and thinks it is time to either step up into the assessor's shoes or retire. Mr. Wickham is well known at Hood River having been a resident here for many years, and has many friends.

To Establish Milk Depot

Geo. D. Hascall has bought the milk and cream business of the Payson Dairy Co., and expects to conduct the business on a new plan. Mr.

Hascall has had considerable experience in the business, having been connected with a large dairy concern in Illinois and will establish a permanent milk depot in Hood River from which the milk will be distributed and where it can be obtained by those who do not care to have it delivered. For this purpose he has rented the apartments in the Davidson building formerly occupied by the Glacier office. The name of the company will be changed to the Purity Dairy Company and Mr. Hascall has secured the services of Geo. James of Husum, an experienced dairyman, to handle the business for him.

OLD LANDMARK TO
BECOME GARAGE

An interesting old landmark in Hood River took a change of position and a new lease of life this week when the old store building on the Paradise Farm tract was moved to be transformed into a garage. The building will occupy a position west of the residence of Mr. and Mrs. LeArmstrong. Originally it was owned by the late Dr. W. L. Adams and was the first store building at Hood River. Its construction was commenced in 1876 and the store was opened for business in 1877. Notwithstanding its long and somewhat varied career the old timer is in an excellent state of preservation and good for many years to come as the home of the irreplaceable hook wagon.
