Newell, president of the State Board of Horticulture is also interested in the project. The company now has 612 acres planted to orchard and will set the balance as soon as possible. It will be held until five years old and then cut up and sold in ten and twenty acre tracts. The Creswell country is looked upon by Willamette valley orchardists as one of the best in that district for growing apples.

The production of apples in the United States has decreased in the past 13 years 46,070,000 barrels. The Department of Agriculture publishes the following figures:

During this 13 years of decrease the population of the United States has increased in excess of 12,000,000.

For every planted tree in Oregon 10 are abandoned, uprooted or played out in the East.

Apples of the east are raised by farmers as a side issue. Apples of the Hood River Valley are raised by specialists as a business.
