An option on a suitable location has been secured and we have been soliciting subscriptions for stock on a proposition which it seems can be made to pay expenses.

We are not having the support that such a movement warrants. No one questions or doubts the many benefits to be derived from the fruit fair, but too many are willing to set by and allow the other fellow to do the work and put up the necessary funds to do the business.

The answer to our question lies with the people of Hood River and Hood River valley. If we are to have a fair (and we never needed one more than this year) we must get busy. A building must be erected and it is up to you fellow citizens to provide the funds.

### THINKS APPLES WILL BRING GOOD PRICES

Bert VanHorn, member of the Davidson Fruit Company, and one of the best posted fruitmen and largest operators in the country, announces that the Davidson Company is in the market for Hood River apples this year and that he believes the crop should bring good money.

Mr. VanHorn has developed as much fruit land as anybody at Hood River, and, in fact, is one of the heaviest owners of orchard property in the valley. Since his arrival here several weeks ago he has made an inspection of the apple crops, and says he takes the opposite view of buyers who believe the Hood River fruit should not bring as good a price as last year. In fact, Mr. Van Horn warns growers against getting cold feet or letting their apples go at anything but a highly profitable figure. His reason for this, he says, is his interest in the Hood River country, and also because he believes crop conditions throughout the country do not warrant any slump in prices. He calls attention to the short crop in many districts, the increase in the demand for fancy apples, and wider market, and adds that growers should not be misled in disposing of their fruits.

The Davidson Company has closed with several growers for their fruit, and expects this year to handle a greater volume of business than in several years.

#### Ascended Mt. Hood Safety
