WILL OPEN UP BIG TERRITORY

Steps are being taken by W. L. Clarke, Mrs. Marlon MacRae, the Epping-Brydle Company, O. L. Vanderbilt, and others owning land in that district, to have the Post Canyon road put through immediately. This road will open up a large territory that is being rapidly developed and some of the landowners have already slashed for the road through their premises. When completed it will make a great deal of land that is available for fruit accessible in the southwest section of the valley and be one of the most desirable districts in the county.

Seven hundred acres of land in this section have been disposed of by Mrs. MacRae to middle west people, most of them from Iowa, and the Epping-Brydle company has also disposed of a good deal of its big tract in this neighborhood. The Iowa people who have bought largely in the MacRae tract have engaged A. C. Hallam of Kansas City to clear between 400 and 500 acres for them. Mr. Hallam expects to arrive here shortly and will bring with him a big steam stump puller and other machinery for clearing and grubbing different from anything. It is claimed, that has been put in use in the valley. Elmer Reeve, an experienced graduate horticulturist, will have charge of the planting and care of the tract until it is five years to six years old, through an agreement he has with the owners.

PENDLETON PLANS WILD WEST SHOW

Articles of incorporation for the Northwestern Frontier Exhibition Association have been filed and all arrangements have been completed for holding the first annual "Round-up" in Pendleton, Ore., which event will be the biggest frontier celebration ever held in the Northwest. It is to be an annual event, and an effort is to be made to make it rival the big shows at Cheyenne and Denver.

When the plan was started a few days ago the capital stock was placed at \$3,000. The committee was overwhelmed with applications for the stock and the amount was increased to \$5,000, and no man was allowed to subscribe more than \$10.

Events characteristic of frontier days and military spectacles by the U. S. army will have place in the contests, which will cover three days, September 29, 30 and Oct. 1.

Pendleton is ideally situated for such a show, since it is the trading center for cattlemen and horsemen in practically all of Eastern Oregon. Several thousand dollars will be offered in prizes, besides each contest in the riding, roping and racing events will be for the championship of the Northwest.

Several hundred Umatilla, Walla Walla, Cayuse, Yakima and Nez Perce Indians are to be invited. Bronco busters and owners of outlaw horses from northern Idaho to Oklahoma have already signified their intention of participating, insuring a frontier show well worth going hundreds of miles to see.

A race track is to be constructed and the racing of cowboys and Indians in old-fashioned western style will be a feature.

Fire in Oak Grove District

A forest fire which started near the home of R. R. Hoge in the Oak Grove district, Sunday, kept neighbors in that district busy for some time keeping it from burning up Mr. Hoge's new house. The fire was finally conquered with shovels and backfiring. Hugh Watson, who has charge of the place, had just moved into the premises, and feared for a time that his furniture would be destroyed. Mr. Hoge and family are at present on their way to Alaska.
