Big Crop of Gravensteins

If other varieties of apples show the big increase in yield that the Gravensteins have Hood River will have a bumper crop and no mistake. It is estimated now that over thirty cars of this early variety will be shipped out of the valley. This is about twice as many as ever went on the market here before and a good many more than even the experienced apple men expected.

The Davidson Fruit Company is busy packing and shipping them, in addition to the Union. Both warehouses are sending them to New York, while the Davidson Company is sending a car or two to Alaska.

Geo. Sargent, one of the premier Gravenstein applegrowers in the valley, tells us that the early variety was never so fine here as this year and reports from other sections of the Valley are to this effect also.
