MYERS AND HOFER VISIT HOOD RIVER

Jefferson Myers, Democratic candidate for the nomination for governor, was here Saturday shaking hands with friends and getting acquainted with Hood River's voting population. Mr. Myers announces himself as a straight out Democrat who has no affiliations with assembly or anti-assembly Republicans, and is the only candidate on the state ticket from Multnomah county. He is unequivocally in favor of the Initiative and Referendum, Direct Primary, Statement No. 1, the Recall and Corrupt Practice Act and so states in his declaration. While here he met the Democratic leaders and is making his canvass on business lines.

Monday Col. E. Hofer of Salem, also an anti-assembly candidate for governor, was a Hood River visitor. Mr. Hofer has adopted a slogan of wide state roads and anti-state wide prohibition and is touring the state in an automobile, from which he speaks at night on the street corners. He had his machine shipped from Portland to The Dalles, where he made a start to cover the interior of eastern Oregon. He had just returned from a similar trip in southern Oregon, including Klamath county. A unique idea among his campaign literature is some verse written by John C. Dreblebaugh in answer to an attack on the colonel by the Oregonian. The colonel says he is not a corporation candidate and is waging his campaign in the interests of good government and against sham, hypocrisy and graft.

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DAVIDSON FRUIT CO. BUYS MOSIER APPLES

The Davidson Fruit Co. last week closed the deal for the fancy Newtowns and Spitzenbergs handled by the Mosier Apple Growers Union at a high figure. The purchase consists of 12,000 boxes of fancy fruit and includes one or two other varieties besides the ones mentioned.

The price paid for the apples has not been given out, but it is said by both parties to the deal to be a corker. The Mosier crop is said to extra fine this year in quality and size and all told will amount to about 25,000 boxes.

Mclsaac & Co. has been incorporated with a capital of \$20,000 and the company will enlarge the business and erect an additional building. Its officers are R. J. Mclsaac, president; G. L. Mclsaac, vice-president, and W. L. McGregor, secretary and treasurer. The big building built for the business is already too small and a warehouse will be erected to handle grain, hay and other supplies.

A reception will be given to the Rev. John Simpson and wife in the assembly room of the new Commercial Club rooms, Tuesday evening, September 13th, and a general invitation is extended to all. Mr. Simpson is the new rector of the Episcopal Church and comes to us with flattering recommendations from Honolulu, where he occupied the pulpit in a large church for four years.

E. P. Loomis, the well known commission man and owner of orchard land at Hood River, arrived here Tuesday and is visiting in the valley. Mr. Loomis, in company with G. D. Woodworth, went to his place in the Upper Valley.
