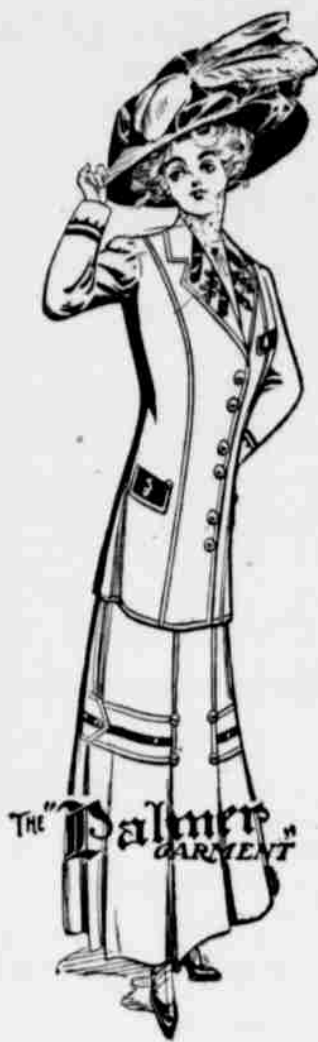

UNCLE SAM AFTER PATENT MEDICINE MEN

"Uncle Sam," says a News correspondent, "has just uncovered a patent medicine joke which, if it were not of national import and serious in its pressure on society in general, would be productive of general laughter."

"Investigators in the Internal Revenue department recently made the startling discovery that 200 medical preparations contain such a high percentage of intoxicating fluid that they are in reality subject to a liquor tax."

"The list was published July 5th by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue and contains nearly one hundred different kinds of 'Bitters,' about thirty 'Tonics,' fifteen 'Ex-laxs,' the same number of 'Cordials,' and a miscellaneous assortment of 'Liver and Kidney Cures,' 'La Grippe Specifics,' 'Cough Cures' and 'Dyspepsia Remedies.'"

"The law provides that medical preparations which contain alcohol must be sufficiently 'medicated' to render them unfit for use as a beverage. Evidently the nostrum manufacturers are overlooking the 'medicinal' portion of their bottled goods. Editorially, the Ladies' Home Journal, one of the strongest temperance papers in the country, clarifies the mystery behind this increase in 'cure-alls' and the fluids they contain in this way:

"When, three years ago Uncle Sam said to the 'patent medicine' manufacturers, 'You must put on each bottle the amount of alcohol in your medicine,' there was strong resentment. Every effort was made to defeat the law. But the law was inexorable and the line '25 per cent alcohol' appeared on various bottles. Every care was, however, taken to have the line appear in as small type as possible. Then a curious change took place. The line '25 per cent alcohol' suddenly appeared in larger type and stuck out prominently on the wrapper. Because the law demanded it? No, the law was the same. The change, curiously enough, came at the same time with the great wave of prohibition throughout the country. To the average mind there would seem to be no special connection here until this significant fact now comes out—that in nearly all the states that have by law recently gone 'dry' the sales of 'patent medicines' having the largest quantity of

alcohol in them have increased. In three 'dry' states, for example, the sales of one 'patent medicine' with '50 per cent alcohol' prominently printed on the bottle, have increased MORE THAN TENFOLD IN SIX MONTHS. To use the words of one 'patent medicine' manufacturer, whose nostrum has a generous amount of alcohol in it: 'These states going dry are all right.' And then he laughed comfortably! But that laugh meant no good to the public."

Glavis on a String

L. R. Glavis, of the Pinchot-Balinger controversy, and who now owns a fruit farm at White Salmon, according to the Enterprise, had a run for his goods last week. It seems that he took a large ball of binding twine out to the ranch and left it in a shed where F. G. Pyatt's choice Jersey cows got hold of the loose end and swallowed the whole thing down for future reference. Glavis was not only distressed for fear Boss' appendix might become "all bound round with a woolen string," but he wanted the twine badly. He did not send for a veterinarian, but coolly sat down and when Boss began chewing her cud, ran his hand into her mouth, grabbed the end of the twine and began running for dear life. Boss got up and followed him for a ways, also on the run, but Glavis darted through a fence and ran the cord through a knot hole in one of the boards. This anchored Boss, but Glavis had to run clear across his 200-acre tract and part way back before he drew out all the twine.

Held Up Carson Springs Bus

A lone highwayman held up the Mineral Springs hotel bus at Carson recently after the 7 o'clock train came in. There were three passengers and the driver on the stage at the time, one being a woman and another the Chinese cook at the hotel.
