WENATCHEE APPLES GO TO GIBSON AT \$1.65

The Wenatchee Republic says that at a meeting Wednesday morning of the directors of the Wenatchee Valley Fruit Growers' Association, contracts were closed for the movement of Jonathans, Grimes Golden and Winter Banana apples. While the officers of the organization are absolutely reticent regarding the quantity of fruit, the identity of the successful bidders and the quotations involved in the transaction, the prevalent opinion is that negotiations were based on all the stock of the named varieties under the control of the association, that the Gibson Fruit Company, of Chicago, obtained the lion's share of the extra fancy grades, and that the price ruled close to \$1.65 on Jonathans, a slightly higher figure on Winter Bananas, and a slightly less figure on Grimes Golden. None of this information, however, can be received as perfectly trustworthy, because it is inferred from what bids were rejected instead of founded on what offers were accepted.

The association has in warehouses here and at Cashmere quite a quantity of Jonathans, Grimes Golden and Winter Bananas, and this fruit, in some instances, has been held, awaiting the action of the directors. Orders have now been issued to forward it without further delay.

Oregon Fruits

Oregon fruits are getting a foothold in the markets of the world, particularly our apples and pears, that will be rapidly extended, says The Dalles Optimist. Those who think that the fruit business is being overdone do not consider that our best products are so sought after that we cannot now begin to supply the demand. The Hood River apple crop is, of course, small in comparison with the output of other districts, as Watsonville, Calif., where the annual output of apples is something like four thousand cars, or more than the entire production of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. But whoever heard of a Watsonville apple? But if Hood River produced twenty times as many apples as they do, the market would not be glutted, and they would bring three or four times as much as the Watsonville fruit. The fruit market will never be overdone if we do as Hood River and the Medford districts are doing—have the fruit perfect and pack it perfect.

ONLY BEATEN BY EIGHT VOTES

Milton J. VanVorst, of White Salmon, member of the Hood River University Club, who was a candidate at the primaries for the nomination of joint senator from Klickitat and Skamania counties, is only beaten by about eight votes, according to the latest figuring. It is said by the White Salmon Enterprise that if every sticker used had been rightly placed he would have won easily. Klickitat county gave him 633 votes and Breslin 599; Skamania gave Breslin 141 votes the better of it. A number have urged Van to get onto the ticket as an independent candidate. The fight for senator will now be between Breslin and Chapple, Democrat, of Goldendale.
