**ELLIS CARRIED
WASCO BY 1 VOTE**

County Clerk F. R. Angle, City Re-
corder P. B. Davis and Justice J. A.
Douthitt completed canvassing the
primary election returns for Wasco
county Friday, and, according to
The Dalles Chronicle, W. R. Ellis car-
ried the county, for the Republican
nomination for congressman, by the
smallest possible plurality, one, re-
ceiving 310 votes to 309 polled by A.
W. Lafferty, the successful candidate.
C. J. Reed received an even hundred
ballots and George H. Sheperd 50.
The vote on governor was: Bower-
man, 333; Dimick, 244; Hofer, 108;
Abraham, 108.

There were 775 Republican votes
cast, a little more than half of the
registered vote, 1378. One hundred
and ninety Democrats voted, less
than half of the Democratic registra-
tion in the county, 426.

For circuit judge S. W. Stark got
473 votes in Wasco out of 775.
The following county officers were
re-nominated, without opposition, for
re-election by the Republicans by the
following votes:

Sheriff Chrisman, 755; County Clerk
Angle, 737; Treasurer Gunning, 737;
Surveyor Mohr, 715; Coroner Burget,
693.

Herbert C. Rooper, of Antelope, in-
cumbent, received the nomination
for county commissioner, getting 400
votes to 337 cast for D. Parvey, of
Mosier, his opponent.

The vote for joint representative
was as follows:

Frank M. Gill, of Dufur, 495; Alex
Stewart, of Mosier, 335; John L. Hen-
derson, of Hood River, 323; J. F.
Watt, of Hood River, 161.

Gill and Henderson were elected,
the latter receiving enough votes in
Hood River county to win out over
Stewart.

Lane Smith received 43 Democratic
votes and was nominated as a can-
didate for sheriff. Sheriff Chrisman
received 17 Democratic votes, J. P.
McInerney was nominated by the De-
mocrats for county treasurer, getting
22 votes, and W. N. Wiley's name
goes on the ticket with McInerney
and Smith, for coroner. He polled
26.

George Ross was nominated for
county clerk, receiving 42 votes to 9
given F. R. Angle, the Republican
nominee. The names of the Demo-
crats did not appear on the ballot
and were written in, this accounting
for the small number of votes cast
for the Democrats. J. T. Harper, of
Tygh Valley, and A. J. Derby, of
Hood River, were nominated by the
Democrats for joint representatives.

S. B. Driver, of Wamic, received 20
votes in Wasco county to Derby's 10,
but the latter polled enough ballots
in Hood River county to win the
nomination. A. M. Young, of Tygh
Valley, was nominated for county
commissioner and will oppose Mr.
Rooper, of Antelope, the Republican
candidate.
