WENATCHEE'S LATEST APPLE PIPE DREAM
R. S. Burgess has at Cashmere one-third of an acre of apple land that excels in productive value any other similar sized tract in the world, says the Wenatchee Republic, and continues: The ground has thirty-six Delicious trees, nine years old, every one of which, this season, will average fifteen boxes, or, all together, a total of 540 boxes. The fruit has been sold for \$3.25 a box, cash, at the loading station, or for an aggregate of \$1,755. At this rate, if Mr. Burgess had the remaining two-thirds of the acre in the same kind of trees of the same age, the yield of the single acre this year would net him \$5,265.
Mr. Burgess sold the 540 boxes of Delicious apples to T. B. Atkinson, representing the Stark Brothers' Nursery Company, of Louisiana, Mo. The nursery company will use the fruit for exhibition and advertisement. It exploits Delicious apples as the best flavored apples in the world, and every season its agents buy the fruit for the purpose of promoting the campaign for the sale of Delicious apple tree stock.

JUMBO, KING OF SNAKES, EXPIRES AT THE DALLES
Jumbo, the big snake with the Arnold Amusement Company, died at The Dalles Friday. The Chronicle states that this regal Python from India was 31 feet and six inches long, said to be the longest reptile in the world. After having refused food for eight months, Jumbo was compelled to eat at Vancouver last Sunday. A horse stomach pump was forced into his throat for two feet and two gallons of milk, two dozen raw eggs, half a pound of sugar and a half a pint of brandy were pumped into his stomach. Mr. Wilbur, one of the owners, who wore gloves, opened the snake's mouth, and Mr. Wilson, his partner, held the head while a veterinary used the pump. The Python is supposed to eat about four times a year, when a rabbit or chicken is crushed and swallowed whole. Jumbo, up until last Sunday, ate nothing since arriving in New York in January. Life was sustained by baths in olive oil. Jumbo's death was probably caused by the lengthy period of starvation. The dead reptile will be placed on ice and exhibited.

November 1st will see the completion of some valuable tests now being made at the Oregon Agricultural College by Prof. James Dryden, poultry husbandman, which will prove the effect of crossing barred Plymouth Rocks with White Leghorns to increase egg production. By means of the trapnest which Prof. Dryden originated some years ago, which is now in use at a number of experiment stations and poultry farms of the country, he has several hundred hens out of the college flock of 2,000 chickens making laying records. While some have made a record of less than a dozen eggs in a year, others have laid over 200 eggs annually.
