**S. W. STARK MAKES
STATEMENT TO VOTERS**

I accepted the urgent request of friends to become a candidate for judge of the circuit court in the Seventh district, comprising the counties of Hood River, Wasco and Crook. While no experienced lawyer can afford to accept the office, yet, for the purpose of giving the attorneys of the Seventh judicial district a chance to carry their cases through court without delay, I agreed to become a candidate for circuit judge, and, if elected, to discharge the duties of the office impartially, without delay, irrespective of politics and without fear or favor.
My opponent, W. L. Bradshaw, the Democratic incumbent, has been in office over nineteen years, for which the people have paid him over \$57,000. He has made successful investments and is now financially well fixed in his old days. His long reign in office is not due to his ability, for over fifty per cent of the cases appealed from his court have been reversed and sent back for new trial, but because the experienced lawyers enjoyed a practice that did not warrant them in accepting the office, and he was elected three times practically without opposition. A term of office is six years, and no man should hold office over two terms.
I, therefore, appeal to the voters of Hood River, Wasco and Crook counties to support my candidacy for the office of circuit judge, believing that you desire an administration of the office that will be more progressive and yet, at the same time, conservative.

**WIDE PUBLICITY FOR
CHICAGO LAND SHOW**

The Pacific Northwest will be well represented at the big Land Show to be held in the Coliseum, Chicago, from November 28 to December 4 of this year. The transcontinental railroads which have exhibit cars touring the country with displays of Washington products, will send them to Chicago for the show. Both the Great Northern and Northern Pacific have such cars, while the Oregon and Washington Railroad has secured the central space in the big show to advertise the products of lands along its line in the northwest. After the close of the Land Show, the exhibits will again be sent on their trip through the eastern and southern states, attracting the attention of the country to the northwest. In one town, Springfield, Ohio, where the Great Northern's car recently spent a few hours, the agent in charge mailed the following report of the event:
"At this place in two days, the 10th and 12th, we have had about 4,500 visitors in the Washington exhibition car and secured names of 1,178 for mailing list and have distributed over 5,000 pieces of printed matter, put into the hands of people who have a great object lesson as well of the resources of the country. After seeing the car and understanding where the material is from, people sought the printed matter; some even went so far as to offer to buy it, not having seen the 'free sign.'"

**HOOD RIVER APPLES
WILL GO TO PANAMA**

J. J. McGillicuddy, banker and merchant, located in the canal zone at Panama, was here last week visiting J. F. Batchelder, and incidentally for the purpose of purchasing Hood River apples.
Mr. McGillicuddy has heretofore been supplying the better class of residents in Panama with apples, but has been dealing in eastern fruit. He says that they do not keep as well as western apples and therefore wants some of the best keepers he can get. Having been informed that Hood River had the best to be obtained in this line, he came here and will receive shipments for the next six months at the rate of 250 boxes a month. He will take choice or second grade, as he says this quality will meet the requirements of the district.
In regard to the progress being made on Uncle Sam's big ditch, this resident of the tropics says that the work has been so well organized that it can almost be conducted now by a novice. Everything in regard to the big waterway has been figured out to a hair, so that it is known now exactly what is to be done, as the work progresses, two years from now. The laborers, who are largely negroes, receive 50 cents a day, but white labor and help of all kinds commands a high figure.

**LIVELY CAMPAIGN FOR
WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE**

One of the most interesting questions to be decided on November 8 in any section of the northwest is the woman's suffrage question, which will be settled by the voters in Washington. Coming before the electorate in the form of a constitutional amendment, the suffrage will require a favorable vote of two-thirds to win, but having the active support of hundreds of women and the benefit of their two years' campaign, with practically no organized opposition, the amendment stands a good chance of passing. It will appear on the official ballots as an amendment for article 6 of the constitution, relating to the qualifications of voters within the state. The rather unexplanatory title may lose the amendment some votes, the voters not being informed as to which is the suffrage amendment. In fact the careless vote has hardly received the serious consideration which it deserves. The women who are working for the amendment will be at the polls, distributing literature and using every effort to win the votes of the men.
