LOCAL REALTY FIRM MAKE MANY SALES

Devlin & Firebaugh announce a number of sales during the week, among them 20 acres belonging to D. K. Richter of Minneapolis to Henry Rodman, near Summit, for \$5500.

The tract adjoins Mr. Rodman's. Mr. Richter and his son arrived here this week and will improve the other twenty they own and build on it.

Thirteen acres were also sold by the Devlin & Firebaugh Company to Herman Glicher of Two Rivers, Wis.

This place belonged to the Hood River Orchard Land Co. and is improved, five acres being in bearing and the rest set to young trees.

It is situated near the Stanley-Smith planer and was sold for \$9000. W. D. Denver also bought a ten acre tract from this firm for which he paid \$9750 with the agreement that the firm would take care of it until it is four years old.

Two acres were sold to S. E. Nesbit for \$700 and 20 acres of the Glenhurst unimproved tract to L. Carstensen for \$3,000. O. L. Craton bought ten acres for \$1,500 and two Japs took 20 acres of the Ellis place for \$2,000, which they will improve and sell.

Another sale was 15 acres on the west side to M. E. Lozier.

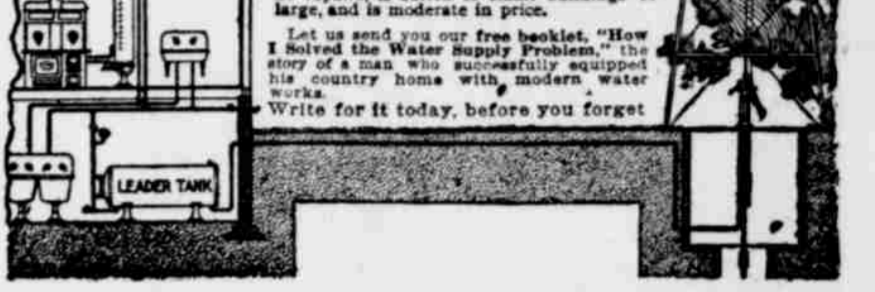
