Fearful that Hood River parents are neglecting to have their boys properly instructed in the Christian faith, D. B. Stokely addresses an open letter to fathers and mothers on the subject. He says:

## PORTLAND MAN BUYS COLLINS HOT SPRINGS

Collins Hot Springs, one of the well known resorts on the upper Columbia river, has been purchased by F. A. Young, of Portland, formerly a sheep king of Eastern Oregon, from Captain C. F. Belcher, who operated the place for a number of

years. Mr. Young plans to improve the property in such a way as to add greatly to the comfort of the patrons of the hotel. Both parties to the transaction decline to make public the consideration, but it is known to have been a considerable sum, as resort property in the Hot Springs area near White Salmon has come up in price in the last few years, due to the largely increasing patronage by Portland and Hood River people.

## STATE GAINS FROM NATIONAL FORESTS

For the fiscal year ended June 30 last, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces the 25 per cent of National Forest revenue which will go to the states for road and school purposes amounted to \$506,194.84. This was \$67,492.03 more than last year, or an increase of a little over 15 per cent. The payments are an offset to the loss of income from taxable property sustained through withdrawal of the forest land from entry under the public land laws.

The amounts which will go to the various states are as follows: Arizona, \$51,220.38; Arkansas, \$2,904.44; California, \$99,752.91; Colorado, \$50,396.19; Florida, \$706.38; Idaho, \$66,074.55; Kansas, \$1,004.67; Minnesota, \$457.37; Montana, \$83,678.38; Nebraska, \$2,820.25; Nevada, \$16,314.33; New Mexico, \$28,529.53; North Dakota, \$63.64; Oklahoma, \$626.10; Oregon, \$39,635.87; South Dakota, \$9,808.93; Utah, \$32,905.49; Washington, \$23,671.80; Wyoming, \$34,704.54.

Noteworthy is the especially heavy increase over the amounts last year in certain states. In California the amount rose by over 25 per cent, in Idaho by over 35 per cent and in Oregon by nearly 50 per cent. The increases are the result of increased activity in national forest timber sales in these states and are an earnest of what will happen as the timber supply which the government is caring for comes into full demand. Since the cut of timber will always be limited to what the forests will keep on growing, the income to the states will be permanent, not transitory, as would have been the case if hasty and improvident exploitation had been permitted. According to the calculations of the department of agriculture officials the states will eventually receive many times what the forests are now yielding them, for there is as yet on the whole only a very restricted demand for the government's timber.
