VOTES STATE AID FOR GOOD ROADS

After recommending the expenditure of \$2,040,000 for state-aid roads, the 200 delegates from all parts of Oregon in attendance upon the good roads convention held in Wemme Hall, Seventh street, Portland, adjourned Monday. Of the large sum mentioned, 33 per cent is to be taken from the \$680,000, or 33 per cent is to be taken from the state treasury and the remainder comes from the counties taking advantage of the state law.

The two important measures were settled by providing that state aid should be one-third and the county two thirds, providing that \$40,000 is expended by the county. The second point was left to the county court to locate the road, with the restriction that "such road shall begin at one of the principal market places in the county or shall connect

with a permanent road leading to such a place, and shall be so located that, when constructed, as herein provided, it will constitute one of the main traveled roads to the place from whence it starts."

A. I. Mason of Hood River was the principal debater of the day, and as each section of the bills was read for consideration he advocated views regarding the methods which should be adopted. He said that he lacked confidence in the county court to fix a road with satisfaction.

The Hood River delegates in attendance at the convention were J. L. Henderson, J. W. Morton, G. D. Culbertson, G. A. McMurdy, O. H. Rhoades, S. W. Curran, B. E. Edleman, Hans Lange, Leslie Butler and A. I. Mason.
