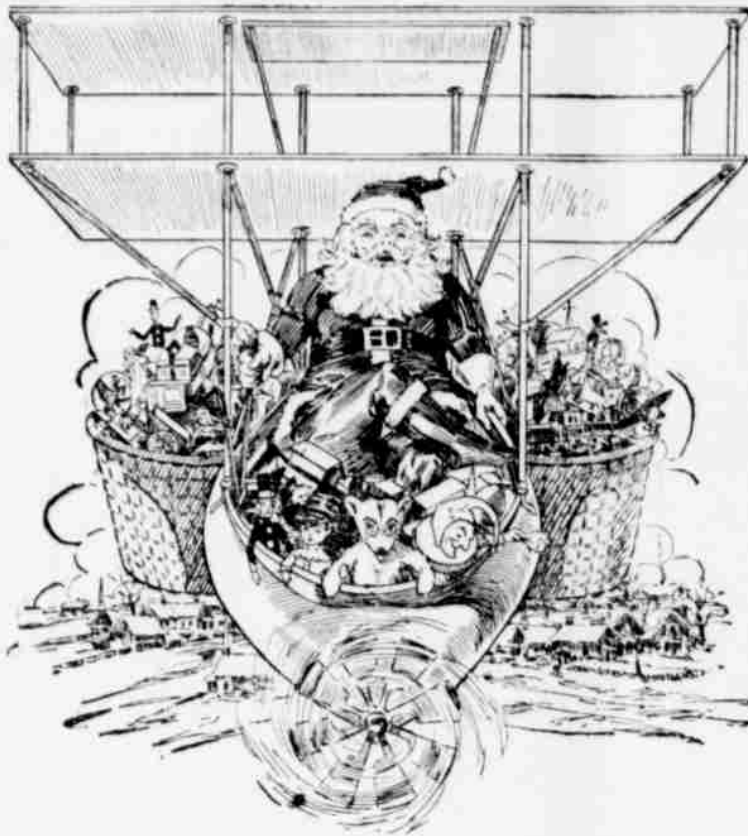

STREET IMPROVEMENT GETS GOOD SUPPORT

C. A. Bell, one of the committee which has been circulating a petition to have Oak street improved, reports that he is meeting with strong support. With the exception of one or two the petition has been signed by most of the property owners on Oak street and it is hoped to get the matter in shape so that work can be started as soon as the weather permits.

The popular plan is to have the excavating done and macadamize the street, putting it at a depth that will allow of a hard surface pavement being placed later.

It is expected that the petition will be presented to the council in the near future and that action will be taken in the matter that will make it possible to commence the work early in the spring. It is proposed to provide the money for the improvement by taking advantage of the Bancroft bonding act, giving property holders the option of paying for the improvement when completed or in installments running over a period of ten years.

Oregon Industrial Notes
Oregon City has a paper mill that is the third largest in the world.
Sberla is buying Oregon apples. One hundred boxes of choice Hood River fruit was recently shipped there for sale.
Four hundred boxes of Comice pears, grown near Medford, sold in the London market this season for \$10 a box.
Oregon's financial condition, as shown by the state treasurer's report, is in excellent condition. There is \$424,913 on hand, with no debts, bonded or otherwise.
A large acreage around Hermiston is being seeded to alfalfa. This is not only a profitable crop for hay, but there is money in raising seed, which brings 25 cents a pound.
Wallowa has a startling potato story. One vine, that grew on new ground, is said to have attained the height of 6 feet, 1 inch in height, and produced 40 tubers, the total weight of the potatoes being 16 pounds.
Oregon raises the best apples. This is no idle boast for not only has this state won the sweepstakes prize at the Spokane National Apple Show two successive years but also captured the first prize of \$1,000 at the Chicago show this year.
State banks have been prosperous the past year, as shown by the annual report of State Bank Examiner Wright, who found individual deposits in Oregon banks on November 10 totaled \$104,270,300, a net gain since November 16, 1909, of \$14,221,550. Total resources of Oregon banks increased during the year almost \$29,000,000.
Estacada, an Oregon town seven years of age, has become one of the most prosperous communities of its size and is attracting much attention as a fruit section. It ranks high in walnut and apple production. Strawberries in the Estacada district yield at the rate of \$200 an acre.
