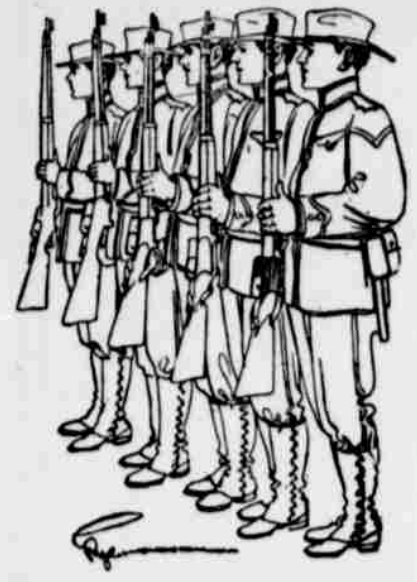

WILL ISSUE BONDS

Dividends for the stockholders of the Home Telephone Company are in sight according to the directors of the Home Telephone company which held its annual meeting Monday, if a \$30,000 issue of bonds can be floated.

About \$24,000 of this amount was subscribed Monday, each of the banks agreeing to take \$5,000 worth of the bonds and Chas. and E. O. Hall \$11,000 of the amount, other stockholders subscribing smaller amounts.

The price of the bonds has been placed at 80. It was explained by President Hall that at this figure the bonds would pay interest at 7 1/2 per cent.

The sale of the bonds, it is said, means interest and dividends on the stock also. The stock, according to Secretary E. O. Hall, now has a book value of \$1.27. At the figure the bonds are offered the company believes that they ought to be taken by the stockholders, who would get the benefit of a rise in value or additional interest.

The decision to sell bonds locally, it was stated, was resorted to after all efforts to market them otherwise had proved a failure on account of inaction in the bond market.

The financial report of the company showed that its receipts during the year were slightly over \$23,000. Of this amount \$7,500, according to the report, was spent in new construction, which included the placing of over 115 miles of new wires and the extension of service into all parts of the valley.

The election for a new board of directors resulted in the selection of four members of the previous board, Chas. Hall, E. O. Hall, E. C. Smith, Claude Cople. C. Dethman was elected to serve in place of J. E. Hall. H. C. McGuire, R. H. Waugh and A. D. Moe were appointed to audit the company's books.

Before adjourning the stockholders voted their approval of the action of the board of directors in deciding to issue bonds and also of their conduct of the company's affairs during the past year.

CITY COUNCIL HOLDS RETIRING SESSION

At its last meeting, which was held Monday evening, the retiring city council passed the ordinance calling a special election to vote on the question of buying the Hood River water plant, by a unanimous vote, and fixed the day for the election for Saturday, January 21. The price named in the ordinance is \$38,000.

The polls will be open on election day from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. The proposition of the Light & Power Company to defray the expenses of the election was accepted by the council and it is believed that it will have the support of both the old and the new city administrations.

Another matter of interest in connection with the water situation was a motion which was adopted instructing the city's attorneys to defend the injunction suit against the city vigorously and to endeavor to bring the matter to a settlement with all possible dispatch, the sentiment of the council being to get it out of the way as a stumbling block to further action in providing for a new system.

A sweeping improvement was set in motion by the council, which instructed the judiciary committee to confer with the city engineer for the purpose of grading all streets in the fire limits.

Another motion that had the unanimous support of the council was to employ competent accountants to audit the city's books, going back for a period of four years.

Ordinances ordering the construction of two sewers were passed and also one ordering the grading and curbing of Columbia street from 7th to 13th street. The report of the retiring committee on finance was submitted and accepted.

The last meeting of the council which has directed the government of the city's affairs for something over two years and which has been the most strenuous administration in the history of city affairs, was smooth and cordial. A desire was apparent to leave the affairs of the city in shape for their successors to start with a clean sheet.
