DISTRIBUTES HOOD RIVER APPLES AT HOT LAKE

Hot Lake, Ore., Jan. 24.—F. H. Button, of Hood River, who is a Sanatorium patient, has been dividing his time today between drinking mineral water and delivering five-minute talks on the merits of Hood River as an apple-growing section. Mr. Button not only has the data at hand, but he also has the apples. Yesterday he received a shipment of Hood River apples, and since their arrival the patients have each been presented with a sample. Hood River is therefore a much talked about place here just now. Mr. Button says he could not afford to let the opportunity pass of demonstrating the virtues of Hood River apples to the two hundred patients, representing more than a dozen states, so he simply wired for the stock of apples. According to Mr. Button, apples and rheumatism make a good combination, especially when the patients are all getting better and the apples are the best ever.

Pushing Deschutes Railroads

The new railroads up the Deschutes river into Interior Oregon are going forward at a rapid rate and are both practically ready for trains for a distance of 71 miles from the mouth of the river. The Harriman line expects to reach the 82nd milepost by February 1, leaving 51 miles to be built to Redmond. It is expected this will be accomplished in May. The Hill road will probably be completed as far as Bend early next summer.
