FRA ELBERTUS WIT AND JOY PEDDLER

Elbert Hubbard, apostle of work and good cheer, not only radiates a desire to labor and be of good cheer, but he is a pretty good practitioner of those happy ways of going through the world. Few men are harder workers than the Fra of East Aurora Erie county, New York, and still a less number are able to apparently get as much fun out of living.

Hubbard was born some place in Illinois, and he grew up a worker, which is perhaps the reason why some persons not knowing the joy of labor might be inclined to call him a duf. When he asked for a job he could not say much of the schools he had attended, but in later years he claimed to be an alumnus of the University of Hard Knocks.

When a fairly young man Hubbard got to thinking and expressed his ideas in such an impressive fashion that the editors called him a Phillistine, instead of buying his manuscripts. After spending considerable time in editors' ante-rooms he concluded to be his own editor, and managing to find an idle print shop



In East Aurora the first number of the Phillistine came out. It was a "periodical of protest" published "every little while." It was wrapped in butcher's paper with a little red ink on it. The inside pages contained a heart to heart talk by the pastor to his flock followed by a few random shots at the world, interspersed with a few "mental Martials" and ending with an ad for little pig sausages. Plenty of capital letters were thrown in to emphasize the good stuff and while the Phillistine was not started as a permanent institution Hubbard has not yet been able to stop it.

This was the beginning, or very nearly so. Hubbard perceived a market for good books well put together and he soon had some expert binders working in a barn. The books sold and more were made. The Roycrofters branched out into making other lines of pretty and useful things and soon established a permanent community of cheerful workers. Hubbard is the moving spirit of all the undertakings. He writes and lectures and edits a good deal, besides writing most of the advertisements for his magazines. The Roycrofters in East Aurora sell flowing bow neckties, music lessons, garden furniture, artistic books, Christmas gifts, hotel accommodations, leather goods and a few hundred other things which they make as well as anybody. Elbert Hubbard, banker, is also helping many people to start and grow savings accounts.

The busy man who is responsible for all these things is coming to Hood River. He will see the valley and give his lecture, "The March of the Centuries," in Heilbronner's hall at 8 o'clock Monday evening, February 20. The management wish the announcement made that there will be no reserved seats.
