Mr. Langille came here 28 years ago and secured a homestead in the Upper Valley. At that time there were but two other settlers, S. M. Baldwin and A. H. Tieman. In that section, both of these pioneers have been dead a number of years. The deceased was born in River John, Nova Scotia, March 29 1841. In addition to his wife he leaves three sons, one of whom, W. A. Langille, is expected to arrive in Portland soon from Alaska, where he has been employed by the United States Forestry Service. The youngest son, H. D. Langille, is a resident of Portland. Mrs. Langille is at present living with him. The other son, H. B. Langille, is Hood River's city recorder.

On receiving the news of Mr. Langille's death H. D. Langille went to Kansas and the body will be brought to Oregon for burial.

MRS. JOHN COWLEY

After a long illness Mrs. John Cowley died at her home in this city Tuesday morning. Mrs. Cowley had been a resident of Hood River for about eight years and was highly esteemed by all who knew her. HEN VALUED AT \$12,000.

Eggs Laid by Black Orpington Are Sold at \$25 Each. Poultry at \$1,200 a pound and eggs at \$25 each seem rather high even in these days, when the high cost of living is a subject of general concern and congressional investigation, but those quotations have recently been made. The poultry was not sold, but the eggs were, and the owner of the hen said in refusing an offer of \$9,000 for her

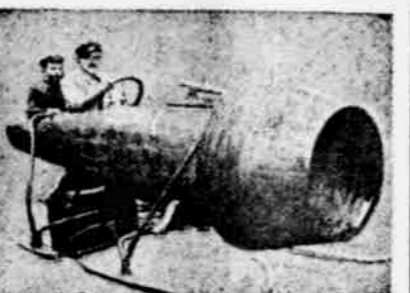


LADY WASHINGTON.

that he was not extremely eager to sell her at \$12,000, which would be at the rate of \$1,200 a pound, live weight. These ten pounds of costly meat and feathers are embodied in the person of Lady Washington, a Black Orpington hen that has won prizes at poultry shows in New York, Philadelphia and other cities. She has a daughter whose eggs are sold at \$25 a dozen, and even the eggs laid by her grand-daughters are entirely too high priced for use in an omelet.

MOTOR SLEDGE IS LATEST.

Russian Grand Duke Has New Style Power Vehicle. Automobiles have been in use for years in Russia, but sledges are popular there where the winters are long and where few vehicles with wheels are seen from November to March.

Efforts to combine the pleasures of motoring with the delights of sledging have often been made, but as a rule they have not been successful. The usual plan has been to have a drive wheel armed with spikes.

The Grand Duke Cyril of Russia has just had a motor sledge built that is constructed on a new principle. It is the familiar sledge on runners, but it carries a six cylinder, thirty horsepower motor to take the place of horses. The vehicle is to be drawn, not pushed, by a propeller constructed on the familiar turbine principle. The sledge is about twelve feet long, has accommodations for two passengers and is expected to develop a speed of a mile a minute.
