West and Good Roads

The action of Governor West in vetoing the good roads measures passed by the legislature is not meeting with support throughout the state. Medford, which was as much interested in securing better highways as soon as possible as was Hood River, is one of the sections where the governor's action is not meeting with approval. In a recent editorial the Medford Sun says:

"The Sun must confess that it is incapable of comprehending the position of Governor West on the good roads question. It is one which affects every man, woman and child in the state, whether they own land or not. The people by a majority of 18,000 passed an amendment to their constitution authorizing counties to go into debt to any amount for good roads, yet when the legislature passed an enabling act to make the amendment effective the governor vetoed it.

"On the other hand, not one per cent of the people of Medford, this valley or any part of the state are anglers. They are interested in the question of preserving the fish of the Rogue river only as they are interested in the general matter of preservation of the elk, which not one in half a million of Americans ever saw in their wild state.

They are interested only in the same way that they are in the preservation of the buffaloes, which have been the same as extinct for thirty years and which hardly one person in 100,000 ever saw in their wild state. An initiative law was passed by a smaller majority than the good roads amendment, yet when the legislature attempted to break down the people's law the governor very properly vetoed the measure.

"But between good roads and the fish in Rogue river as a matter of public consequence—the two are not to be mentioned the same day.

"The governor waves off the good roads matter by saying the people can wait two years; that there is no special hurry. If they must wait two years and he regards the matter of good roads as lightly as he intimates in a recent interview, what guarantee is there that he would not veto a bill at the next regular session.

"The Sun believes it may be pardoned, therefore, in assuming that the Governor is opposed to the people's good roads measure and that he is an enemy to good roads. He certainly has not shown himself to be their friend, and it is a pretty fair estimate of a man in his position in a matter of this kind to assume that if he is not for you he is against you."

Gives Good Advice

Frank A. Vanderlip, president of the National City Bank, New York, formerly an assistant to the secretary of the treasury, has handed out good advice to Oregonians the past week. He says that every man should get a piece of land and he urges that now is the time to get it. Mr. Vanderlip was entertained during the past week by the Portland Commercial Club. He expressed great confidence in the future of Oregon, saying that its great opportunities impressed him with the wisdom of every man securing for himself and family a piece of land, as it will not be a great while until a poor man will be unable to do so.

In discussing the financial situation, Mr. Vanderlip expressed the belief that business conditions in the country at large are taking a hopeful turn. He finds banks are sound, crop prospects good, and a general confidence in the future.

NORTHWEST NOTES

Pendleton wants more daylight and may turn the clocks ahead one hour on May 1. This will give the city Mountain Time throughout the summer, and on October 1 the timepieces of the city will be set back as before. In this way, Pendleton people hope to make the most of the long days of the year.

The exploitation of Douglas fir will be undertaken by the manufacturers of Oregon and Washington, and a fund was set aside at a recent meeting to carry on a publicity campaign. It is felt that with such immense quantities of fir timber available in the two states, it can be given a much wider market in the future.

Invitations have been sent to Oregon people to attend the North Yakima Blossom Festival, April 15-22. At that time there will be thousands of acres of orchards in bloom throughout the Yakima Valley, and a visit will be well worth while. Various attractions are being arranged for the entertainment of visitors.

A resolution standing by the legislative appropriations for the state educational institutions, was adopted during the past week by the promotion committee of the Portland Commercial Club. The resolution demanded adequate facilities for the education of the young, and expresses the belief that the sums set aside by the legislature are not at all excessive.

Checks are being sent out this week to pay the prizes just awarded by the judges in the prize article contest of the Portland Commercial Club, which secured a great deal of valuable publicity for Oregon and the Pacific Northwest. In all, \$5,000 was awarded in prizes among 80 successful contestants. An Oregon man, R. R. Howard, won the first prize.

Married at Dufur

A very pretty wedding, says the Dufur Dispatch, was solemnized at Grass Valley last Sunday morning when Thomas B. Slusher and Miss Margaret Sigman, both of Dufur, were united in marriage. The ceremony was performed at the home of the bride's sister, Mrs. C. D. O'Leary, and was witnessed only by the immediate friends and relatives. The newly married couple departed for Portland for a short honeymoon, after which they will return to Dufur and make their home in the upper Fifteen Mile valley, where Mr. Slusher has a nice farm and home. Both Mr. and Mrs. Slusher have spent almost their entire lives in the vicinity of Dufur and have innumerable friends there.
