DIED

MRS. ANN CAMPBELL ROE.
Mrs. Ann Campbell Roe died Wednesday, April 5th at Heppner, Oregon.

Ann Campbell was born in Rock Island, Illinois, February 3rd, 1833, and removed to Oregon in the year 1852. On July 14th, 1856 she was married to the Rev. George C. Roe, who had already served two years as an itinerant Methodist preacher. From the day of their marriage to the time of his death, October 6th, 1896, she journeyed with him, making a cheerful and faithful helpmeet during all the hardships of his life as a pioneer preacher.

When Mr. Roe was presiding elder on the district that embraces all the eastern Oregon country as far east as Pendleton, and south to the John Day river, there was not a mile of railroad. When he left his home in Goldendale for the quarterly round in this direction, it required an absence of eight weeks, and when he went out on the other side it required five weeks. During all the years of his arduous ministry, Mrs. Roe met her duties bravely. Mr. Roe did the pioneer work over this country where now are many splendid churches, for which he deserves great honor, and his faithful wife also.

After her husband's death which occurred in Hood River in 1896 when they had been residents of this place but a few days, Mrs. Roe made her home with her daughter, Mrs. C. E. Woodson of Heppner, Oregon. During the last three years of her life she was confined to her room but she was bright and happy until the end.

Mrs. Roe was the mother of five children. Two sons are dead, and two, Carlton C. Roe of Buenos Aires, Argentine, and William C. Roe of St. Johns, Oregon, are living. There is also one daughter, Mrs. C. E. Woodson of Heppner, Oregon. The last two mentioned were present at the funeral, as were also four grandchildren. She has six grandchildren. She was buried in the K. of P. cemetery Friday evening April 7th, beside the body of her husband.
