HOOD RIVER ORCHARD SUIT STIRS PORTLAND

Hood River was the recipient of much sensational publicity Monday, in the Portland press, when the suit of Oscar Vanderbilt against Mrs. C. R. Schmick and Mrs. Muriel Bishop, to recover the balance of \$33,000 as part of the purchase price of the orchard they bought here, was brought to trial in the United States court.

Mrs. Bishop and Mrs. Schmick are seeking to recover \$10,000 paid on the place and \$2,000 put on it in improvements. The attorney for the defendants claims the orchard was worth but \$20,000. In rebuttal, Mr. Vanderbilt states that he received \$11,000 from it in 1908, an income of 25 per cent on the amount paid for it by Mrs. Schmick and Mrs. Bishop.

Claims of misrepresentation on the part of J. L. Henderson, who sold the orchard, are also made.

John Hall, who is appearing as attorney for Mr. Vanderbilt in the absence of Jesse Stearns and A. J. Derby, of Hood River, claims, however, that Henderson cautioned Mrs. Schmick to investigate all propositions made her, carefully, and alleges that no misrepresentations were made in the sale of the property.

ADVENTISTS MAY HOLD SUMMER MEETING HERE

The Seventh Day Adventists are to hold a Teachers' Institute and Summer Normal somewhere between Walla Walla and Portland, on the Columbia river, during July and August. A committee of three, consisting of Prof. M. E. Cody, president of Walla Walla College; Prof. J. B. Clymer, principal of Meadow Glade Academy, near Vancouver, Wash., and Prof. J. L. Kay, principal of Laurelhurst Academy, near Portland, Oregon, have visited several places along the Columbia with a view of selecting a suitable location, and have decided on holding this educational gathering at or near Hood River. There is some thought of accepting the generous invitation of G. D. Woodworth to occupy his private camping grounds near Parkdale, in the Upper Valley. Mr. Early, of Mt. Hood Railroad, has promised a reduction of rates and other courtesies which will make the side trip pleasant and convenient.

This will be quite a representative gathering, as the Seventh Day Adventists have a college at Walla Walla and nine academies, besides a score or more of primary schools, in the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. It is expected that at least one hundred teachers will be present at the institute, which occupies the first week. Final decision as to the location will be made within the next week or ten days, as the announcements will soon be ready for circulation.

MARCH WEATHER RECORD SHOWS UNUSUAL MONTH

The report of H. L. Hasbrouck, local weather observer, shows March to have been a very mild month, with a rainfall far below normal.

According to the report, spring broke on the first of the month and the frogs commenced to sing. The minimum temperature during March was 29 degrees, which occurred on the first day of the month. On the second and third a minimum temperature of 22 degrees is reported, with a killing frost on the first, second and third. The maximum temperature is recorded on the 30th and 31st, when the mercury crawled up to 80 degrees on both days.

The total rainfall was 25 inches, the greatest precipitation being on March 24th, when 10 of an inch fell. A trace of snowfall is shown during the month, occurring on the 23rd. An unusual record for March was 28 clear days and only four cloudy.
