## The Round Earth.

The globular form of the earth was not discovered, but simply rediscovered, by the moderns. The globular form of the earth was taught by Thales of Miletus as early as 640 B. C., and Pythagoras, about 560 B. C., demonstrated from the varying altitudes of the stars that the earth must be round. Aristotle of Samos maintained as long as 280 B. C. that the earth was globe shaped and turned on its own axis. So far as we moderns are concerned the rotundity of the earth was first proved beyond all cavil by the great voyage of circumnavigation by Magellan in 1522. Since that time there has been but one side to the question of the earth's shape.
