The Greeks went to an employment office in Portland looking for work. McCoy, who was at the employment office represented to them that by paying the employment office \$1.00 each, and signing a paper which he represented to be a pay roll, he would give them work clearing land at Hood River.

By an overwhelming majority the voters of The Dalles have decided to set aside 40 acres belonging to the city, for a public park. The new park site lies immediately south of the city on an eminence overlooking the town and surrounding country. It is said to be an ideal location for a public park, and with very little improvement can be made a most delightful place. It is sparsely wooded with oak and pine trees, just sufficient to afford shade. It is near the city water works, and water can be forced upon the tract with a hydraulic ram at light expense. The setting aside of this new park is the result of the efforts of the women's club, the Sorosis, which some three years ago began the agitation. At the recent election they had an initiative presented to the voters dedicating the land for park purposes and providing for its improvement and maintenance.
