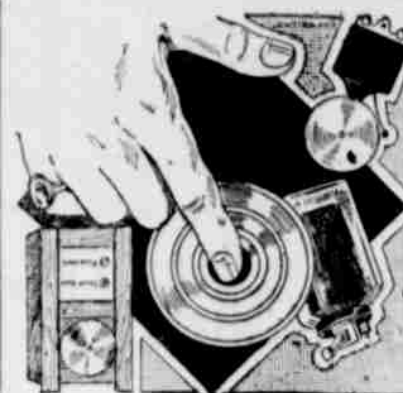

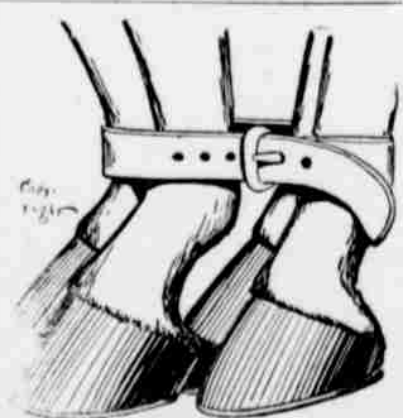

## TO BRING ACTION AGAINST SPEEDERS

The Hood River court states that drivers of automobiles within the county bounds must observe the speed law. Twenty have been timed on the west side macadam road and have been found exceeding the speed limit, which is 25 miles per hour.

Warrants for the arrest of the drivers are now in the hands of the authorities. A portion of the new macadam road over which the speeding is done is being ruined and the court proposes to put an end to the process.

## FRANK FERGUSON BELIEVED MURDERED

That Frank Ferguson, a popular young man of The Dalles, has met foul play or a serious accident, is the belief of his friends and relatives, as well as the police. It appears that the wearer of the hat was struck over the head with a large bolt, for marks which appear to be indentations of the threads are still on the hat.

That Ferguson was not intending to leave the city is shown by the fact that his money and watch were left at home and nearly a month's wages were left undrawn at the Wasco warehouse mill, where he was employed.

The missing man has a wife and a small child at The Dalles, as well as parents and many other relatives.

Ferguson was a member of The Dalles baseball team and visited Hood River frequently, being well known here.

## HANDLING APPLES AND PEARS

It is unjust to those growers who make arrangements early with us to handle their apples if we allow others to come in with their crops so late in the season that the best markets are supplied with apples from other districts.
