BAD CHECK ARTIST COMES TO GRIEF

A man representing himself to be T. Lamphier and so signing worthless checks on the Wasco Warehouse Milling Company's bank at Moro, was arrested Saturday at Hood River, at the instance of Sheriff Levi Chrisman, on the charge of passing worthless checks. Lamphier it is said went the "pace pretty strong" at The Dalles during the past few days, taking long automobile trips and "punishing" boozes, paying for the same with checks that were returned because there were no funds in the Moro bank subject to his check. Sheriff Chrisman came to Hood River and took Lamphier back to The Dalles.

Lamphier and a companion were driven to Hood River from The Dalles by a son of Justice Douthitt who had been taking them joy riding about the country for several days. He had not settled with the young chauffeur except to give him a bad check for ten dollars as a tip. Young Douthitt who had not attempted to cash the check was unaware of its worthlessness until Lamphier was arrested. The latter was taken into custody by Wm. Ganger a few minutes after he arrived here.

WHITE SALMON

The nine o'clock curfew ordinance has again gone into effect with the Methodist church bell to serve notice.

Sixty thousand sheep passed onto the Columbia River Forest Reserve Wednesday in about twenty bands. Chief Forest Ranger Harry DeVoe, of Glenwood, says they come from Roosevelt, Goldendale and Toppenish districts, and come out in the fall in such good condition that they bring the highest returns of any forest ranged sheep in the Northwest. A charge of 7 cents per head is made for a summer's grazing on the government lands.

The wife of the editor of the Enterprise writes from Minnesota that the thermometer was at 98 and while a wind was blowing it was as if it were coming straight from a hot oven, and drying everything up fast. Another withering heat wave struck the middle west the latter part of the week. PARTY WILL ASCEND MTS. HOOD AND ADAMS

A party of 79 members of the Mountaineers, a Washington organization similar to the Mazamas of Oregon, will leave Seattle shortly to climb Mt. Adams.

The distance from Seattle to the mountain will be covered on foot. Twenty-eight pack horses, loaded with provisions and camping outfits start from Seattle and cache the supplies enroute for the mountain climbers.

After ascending Mt. Adams the party will come through the White Salmon Valley to the North Bank railroad and fifty of them will go to Portland. The other twenty will cross to Hood River, go to Cloud Cap Inn and make the ascent of Mt. Hood.

REVOKE LICENSE OF UNDERWOOD SALOON

The county commissioners have revoked the saloon license of Amos Underwood, says the Stevenson Pioneer, and given him ninety days to dispose of his stock. Both sides put up a hard fight before the commissioners, and the decision, which was rendered last Thursday morning, is in the nature of a compromise between the two factions.

The decision of the commissioners was arrived at after a petition signed by 104 residents of Underwood had asked the commissioners to close up the saloon at that place. They claim that the petition was signed by fully 90 per cent of the voters of the precinct.

OREGON LUMBER COMPANY MILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Through a postal received several days after the event, Chas. T. Early was made aware of the fact Thursday that Mill A, situated on the Washington side of the river opposite Viento was burned to the ground recently causing a loss to the Oregon Lumber Company of \$8,000.

The mill was abandoned several years ago and it is thought by those living in the vicinity that it was accidentally set on fire by fishermen who have been camping near it. As there was no watchman its destruction is a total loss to the company.

Goat Adopts Fawn
