Agriculture As A Science
Hail to the tiller of the soil. He has won the respect of the world. Perhaps you have noticed that it isn't so common to deery his occupation as it used to be before Uncle Sam discovered it to be a science. Now young men are flocking to the agricultural schools and colleges and many of them are graduating into professorship, or into positions as experts with the government. One of the latter has just returned to Washington after spending two months in Spain and Sicily investigating lemon growing. He is G. Harold Powell, whose work for the Department of Agriculture in the investigation of causes of fruit decay in cold storage and in transit attracted such wide attention. The citrus fruit growers of California held his talents in such esteem that they tried to get him to go out there. When they got up to an offer of \$10,000 a year he succumbed, and he is now secretary and manager of the Citrus Protective League of California, a model business organization of agriculturists, which has been fighting for a tariff on lemons that will permit the industry to survive. Having secured that tariff, the organization is now combating the organized campaign of the Sicilian importers to have it reduced. The latter have raised a big fund to influence public opinion in this country and to affect legislation.

Alaska's Troubles
The enemies of Alaska are at it again; but with little promise of making any other headway to delay progress. This time, they have tried to make it appear that Richard S. Ryan's operations at Controller Bay were in the interests of the Guggenheims. The latter people deny that Ryan is their agent and that they have any interests at Controller Bay, which is not a desirable harbor. Ryan is said to be interested in putting over a private mining deal. He has been shrewd enough to get his name into all the newspapers headlines of the country, which advertising he will use to assist the sale of stock. Such methods as these prejudice many persons against Alaska and it is unfortunate for that territory that they should be able to get so much publicity.

Land Show Agents Active
There will be three big land shows in the East this fall. New York, Chicago and Omaha are planning to hold exhibits that will let prospective homeseekers know what the entire country has to offer. All transcontinental railroads are aiding in these projects, lending them generous financial assistance. The agents of the various shows have been active in the Northwest for some time, lining up the various districts. It is safe to say that Oregon and Washington will be well represented.

Elks Select Portland
Portland has won the 1912 National Meeting of the Elks, which means that it will be host to one of the largest gatherings in the country next year. The Portland lodge sent a large delegation to Atlantic City several weeks ago, and secured the annual gathering for 1912. This is a big event and one that will do much to attract attention to the entire Pacific Northwest.

Tobacco in France
The government tobacco monopoly in France was established by Emperor Napoleon Bonaparte in a decree issued Dec. 20, 1810. This decree reserved to the government a monopoly of the importation, manufacture and sale of tobacco in all its forms.

NORTHWEST NOTES
Willamette Valley counties will combine to make splendid exhibits at the State Fair at Salem and later the fruits, vegetables, grains and grasses grown on Oregon soil will be sent East to be exhibited at five of the largest land shows in the country next fall. At a meeting at Albany during the past week, representatives from Lane, Benton, Marion, Polk and Lane counties agreed to the program, and Yamhill county will join in the plan also. The Willamette Valley exhibit will be shown at New York, Omaha, Chicago, Knoxville and St. Paul.
The Hill interests will spend \$25,000,000 in extensions and betterment to the properties in this state, according to advices received from the East. This sum will be made available for more mileage, aiding in the development of the whole state. The United Railways and the Oregon Electric will be extended and other feeder lines of the North Bank road, the backbone of the Hill system in the Northwest, will be pushed.

The State Land Board has finished a trip through the Lakeview region, inspecting lands there under state control, and upon their return members of the board expressed themselves as enthusiastic over the future prospects of that section of the state. In fact, they were surprised that any public land remains in that part of Oregon.
Mining men, capitalists and bankers of the southern part of the State have formed the Southern Oregon Mining Bureau, which shall gather and disseminate information on Oregon mines. Men who have the confidence of the public have charge of the organization, which will publish a book telling of the State's mineral resources for the guidance of investors.

Colonist rates to Oregon will again be in effect this fall, from September 15th to October 15th, on a basis of \$25 from St. Paul and the Missouri river to any point in this state, or \$35 from Chicago. Railroad traffic officials expect there will be a heavy movement to the Pacific slope this fall, for there is a heavy inquiry already about the rates.
The Commercial Club of Vancouver, Wash., has the right idea. It will foster closer business relations between the business men of that city and the farmers throughout the county. Frequent visits to each part of the county will be made by the city men, and every possible assistance will be given those of the outlying country. Co-operation in building roads and other matters of mutual benefit will be the motto.

"Across the Continent."
There is a striking significance, a wealth of the romantic atmosphere of the awakening West, and a vivid, elaborate picturing of the wilderness responding to the genius of Western constructive civilization in the beautiful book written by Isabelle Carpenter Kendall, entitled "Across the Continent," a copy of which has just come to the editorial desk. It is the first book of the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railway, and as a luxuriously designed and printed volume descriptive of the wonderlands between the Mississippi and the Pacific Ocean it compels attention as a superb work of art. The book contains some seventy large quarto pages of heavy calendared paper and the elaborate picture work in colors throughout, as well as the distinctive letter press and art work, disarm criticism. Its chief significance lies in its demonstration of the scenic grandeur and magnificence of the 1,400 miles of new railway through new territory in the prolific West. The text is a concise, impressive descriptive story of a trip over the entire line, and the reproductions of photographs in colors are splendid examples of engraving and printing art. The principal towns and districts along the line are comprehensively described, as well as the chief elements of improved railroad building that have attracted world-wide attention to the Milwaukee road, which represents in some respects the most remarkable of modern accomplishments in railroad construction. 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WANT TO BUILD ELECTRIC ROAD HERE
Articles of incorporation were filed Wednesday, at Salem, with the Secretary of State, by the Hood River Terminal Company of Portland, the incorporators being W. A. Delashmunt, A. B. Ireland and W. S. Chapman.
It is set out in the articles that the company desires to construct either a steam, gasoline or electric road from a point on the O.-W. R. & N. road in Hood River to the steam boat landing one-half mile east of the city.
The company also desires to construct a line from the north end of First street in Hood River northerly to a point where the east line of the Coe Donation land claim, if extended northerly, would intersect the line of extreme low water in the Columbia River. The company is capitalized at \$5000.
