HOOD RIVER SPRINGS BECOMING FAMOUS

"The water is free from poisonous metals and organic substances. The above analysis was made by Victor Hampton, Oregon's noted chemist.

"He took it to physicians and chemists of Hood River and Portland, and they pronounced it equal to the waters of the world famed and celebrated Chalybeate Springs of this and foreign countries.

"Out of this discovery has arisen a corporation known as the Hood River Mineral Springs Company, which has become the possessor of these springs and much of the beautiful country about them, as well as a very fine paying apple orchard, over 12 acres of which is now in full bearing.

WILL ENDEAVOR TO FLY AROUND ADAMS

Rising upward and floating up over the pines and firs towards the snow capped peak of Mt. Adams in an aeroplane of the Farman biplane type, is what Peter Troh, aged 68, of Glenwood, has scheduled for about the first of September, says the White Salmon Enterprise.

For several months the old man has been working away quietly up there at the base of Adams, 30 miles north of White Salmon. The frame work of the machine is completed and is 50 by 20 and 20 feet high. A 60-horse power motor is now on the way. No wheels will be attached as the confident old man says it must rise from the ground without gliding and alight the same way. The model is original with Mr. Troh. The nearly 70-year-old man has the intrepidity of a youth and will be his own aviator.

Another invention of Mr. Troh's is a brake for a sled, successfully holding it forward or backward. It is patented in this country and Canada, and for it he received a gold medal at the Yukon Exposition.
