NARROW ESCAPE IN RUNAWAY ACCIDENT

A miraculous escape from death or serious injury is reported by Earl Bartness, who with his wife, baby, and Miss Floy Hinkle, his wife's sister, were thrown out of a wagon in runaway accident on the west side Sunday evening.

The party were driving in town from Mr. Bartness' homestead, when one of the shafts on one side became loose and caused the horse to get beyond control. The occupants stayed in the wagon which was swaying from side to side, until it hit an obstruction when they were dashed to the ground.

Although severely shaken up and bruised Mr. and Mrs. Bartness and Miss Hinkle escaped serious injury. On looking about for the baby it was not at first to be found. Later it was discovered some distance from the final smash lying in the middle of the road uninjured and smiling.

The horse, which became loose from the wagon was found nearby quietly grazing.
