M. O. LOWNSDALE ORCHARDIST, DEAD

Millard Oregon Lowndsale, one of the leading horticulturists of the Pacific Coast, and formerly owner of the famous Lowndsale orchard near Lafayette, Ore., died Monday afternoon at 6 o'clock at his home on Clackamas street, Portland.

Mr. Lowndsale had been in poor health for more than a year. Last Fall he was obliged to undergo an operation at St. Vincent's Hospital, but his condition did not improve and his health gradually failed.

The veteran orchardist was well known here through his warlike contention that Willamette valley fruit

was "just as good" as Hood River's and also through his exhibitions in competition with local fruit.

The Oregonian gives a brief history of Mr. Lowndsale's life as follows: Mr. Lowndsale was born in Portland, November 21, 1851, and was the son of Daniel H. Lowndsale, one of the earliest pioneers and owner of a large part of the original townsite.

Mr. Lowndsale was educated at the old Portland Academy, and afterward went East to school. In early manhood he became widely known for his remarkable voice and appeared many times on the concert stage. After several years of study he was offered an engagement in grand opera, but did not accept any of the proposals as he would not adapt himself to the restraints of the profession.

He returned to Portland and took

up the study of law, but never practiced. On the death of his father he inherited a large fortune and 18 years ago purchased the tract since known as the Lowndsale orchard, in Yamhill county. Always a student Mr. Lowndsale devoted himself to the study of apple culture. He became in time a leading authority on the subject, and did more than any other individual to revive the apple growing industry in the Willamette Valley.
