### MOSIER BUSINESS MEN ELECT NEW DIRECTORS

A new board of directors of the Mosier Commercial Club has been elected for the ensuing year, the personnel of which is as follows: J. N. Mosier, president; C. J. A. S. Ashley was appointed manager of the club and will have full charge of all publicity.

The centennial celebration will have an added interest for delegates to the League gathering and Astoria, known far and wide for its hospitality, will make a special effort to entertain the Leaguers. On the whole, the approaching convention promises to be the best ever held in the history of the state-wide development body.

### MOSIER WILL SOON HAVE ELECTRIC LIGHT

The Pacific Power & Light Co. has commenced stringing its local feed wires from Hood River to Mosier, and expects to have the line constructed to that point by October 1. The main line of the company passes about a half mile back of Mosier, and it will be necessary to construct a line from the main line to this point.

W. B. Salt, a representative of the company, was there securing contracts for the lighting both from town residents and fruit growers. The company requires a five year contract. The Commercial Club will place six cluster lights on Main street superseding the present system of lighting with gasoline lamps.
