ANDRUS DIED

Andrew Jackson Rand, better known as "Jack" Rand died at his home near this city Wednesday, aged over 81 years. The cause of his death was lockjaw, which developed some time ago but was not discovered until it was too late to save his life.

The hardy old pioneer, who had seen and experienced strenuous times in the early days of the western country, was born in Steubenville, Ohio, February 14th, 1828. He was twice married, his first wife bearing him eight children, several of whom survive. In 1865 he was again married at Hood River to Mrs. John Rand, who with two grandchildren, survives him.

Leaving his Ohio home in early life Mr. Rand came to the plains and was a scout, hunter and trapper for a number of years. He is credited with guiding more miners to the gold fields in the Black Hills country during the mining excitement than any man of his time and was an intrepid and skillful hunter. Some years ago he acquired the property east of town, where he resided at the time of his death, and devoted the rest of his life to fruitgrowing and gardening. His tall, ungainly figure was a familiar one about town and he was known to a large circle of old residents of Wasco and Hood River counties.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at Bartmess Chapel, conducted by Rev. J. E. Parsons. Burial was in Idlewild Cemetery.

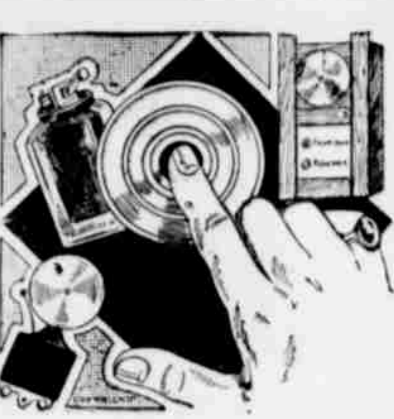
