SYNOPSIS OF FISH AND GAME LAWS

At the request of a number of hunters, we are publishing a synopsis of the Oregon game laws. As the laws are somewhat lengthy and are being enforced more rigidly this year than formerly, it may be of considerable benefit for those interested to preserve these regulations.

Sale of Game Prohibited.—It is unlawful to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange, or have in possession for the purpose of sale, barter or exchange, or to ship or cause to be carried, or transported beyond the boundaries of the state of Oregon for sale, barter or exchange, the carcass of any game animal.

And it is unlawful at any time to ship, carry or transport, or cause to be shipped, carried or transported beyond the boundaries of the state, any wild Duck or wild Swan.

Flesh, Skin, Hide, Horns, Hams, Etc.—It is unlawful at any time to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession any deer or elk for the purpose of obtaining the skin, hide, horns, hams or other flesh of such animal for the purpose of sale, barter, exchange or trade; or to buy or offer to buy, or to sell or offer for sale, or to have in possession for sale, or to transport or carry any such skins, hide, horns, hams or other flesh of such animals for the purpose of sale, barter, exchange or trade; excepting, however, that deer skins may be shipped and sold upon being properly tagged. For tags, apply to any Justice of the peace or county clerk.

License.—It is unlawful for any person to hunt for, pursue, take, catch or kill any of the game animals, fowls or birds protected by the laws of this state, or to take, catch or kill any trout, salmon trout, salmon or bass with hook and line, commonly called angling, without first having procured from the county clerk of one of the counties of this state a license therefor, which license the hunter or angler must have with him and in his possession at the time of hunting or fishing. A license procured in any county is good for the entire state. All licenses expire December 31 of each year. The steps for obtaining hunters' and anglers' licenses are similar.

Fees.—Hunters' license for citizens of Oregon, one dollar; nonresidents, ten dollars. Anglers' license: Male residents over 15 years of age, one dollar; nonresidents, five dollars.

The law says "That no license shall be required of a man or members of his own family for permission to hunt or angle upon his own land."

HUNTING SEASONS.

Beaver.—Closed until 1920.
Buck Deer.—Open from August 1 to November 1 of each year. Limit: Five deer in any open season. In Wallowa, Union, Baker, Umatilla, Grant, Malheur and Harney counties, open from September 15 to November 1 of each year.

Female Deer.—Closed within the state of Oregon at all times.

Night hunting, use of dogs, lying in wait upon or near runways, dry or wet stands, trails, creeks or rivers for the purpose of hunting deer of either sex, and mutilating of carcass to disguise sex, prohibited. Sale of deer, or deer or elk meat, prohibited.

Spotted Fawn or Young Deer of the First Year.—Closed at all times within the state.

Elk.—Closed within the state until August 1, 1919.

Mountain Sheep and Antelope.—Closed at all times within the state.
Silver Gray Squirrel.—Closed from January 1 to October 1 of each year.

Generally speaking, the law prohibits night hunting and the use of sink-boats, sink-boxes, sneak-boats, steam or gasoline launches or other power boats, batteries, swivel or pivot guns, fire, flash-lights, and blinds which stand out more than 100 feet from the shore or margin of any lake or river.

Ducks.—Except in the counties hereinafter stated, closed from February 15 to October 1 of each year. Clatsop, Columbia and Multnomah counties closed from January 15 to September 1 of each year. Baker county closed from April 15 to August 1 of each year.

Grant, Harney, Malheur, Morrow, Union, Umatilla and Wallowa counties, closed from April 1 to September 1 of each year.

Cook, Curry and Lake counties, closed from March 8 to September 15 of each year.

Klamath county, closed from February 1 to September 1 of each year. Limit: Throughout the state, 35 in any seven consecutive days.

Sale of ducks is prohibited, except between November 15 and December 15 of each year.

Geese and Swan.—Closed from March 1 to October 1 of each year. Geese and swan (except white geese or brant) in Harney, Grant, Klamath, Malheur, Lake, Baker, Union, Wallowa and Sherman counties, closed from February 1 to September 1 of each year.

Gilliam county, closed from April 1 to September 1 of each year.

Note: In the ten counties last above named it is lawful, at any time, to kill any white geese or brant.

Hunting of wild geese is prohibited at all times on any island or sandbar on which wild geese habitually rest or roost in or along the Columbia river east of the Cascade mountains; but wild geese may be shot in or upon any grain fields to prevent destruction of grain or growing crops.

Canadian or Honker Geese.—In the counties of Grant, Harney and Malheur, closed from March 1 to September 1 of each year.

(Rall, Coot, Plover, Phalarope, Sandpiper, Snipe, Tattler, Willet, Curlew, Stilt, Avocet, Killdeer, Surf-bird, Turnstone and other shore birds), closed between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of October of each year. Limit: Fifty in one week.

It is unlawful between March 1 and September 1 to burn or cause to be burned, or set fire to or to destroy by fire, any reeds or tules in the tule lands or swamps where ducks, geese and other birds are accustomed to nest.

There are provisions against trapping, netting and snaring, robbing nests and placing poisoned wheat, and also against trespass, which apply to all sections of the state.

Chinese (Torquatus) Pheasant.—Closed to October 15, 1913; then open from October 15 to November 15 of each year.

Note: Having in possession the feathers, carcass, or any other portion of any dead ring-necked or Chinese (Torquatus) Pheasant during the "closed" season, is prima facie evidence that the person having the same is guilty of violating the law.

Silver Pheasant, Golden Pheasant, Copper Pheasant, Green Japanese Pheasant, Reeves' Pheasant, English Partridge, Hungarian Partridge, Bob White Quail.—Closed at all times.

Grouse, Native Pheasant or Ruffed Grouse and Partridge.—Open from October 15 to November 15 of each year.

In Union, Wallowa, Baker, Umatilla and Grant counties, open from August 15 to October 1 of each year. Limit: Within state, not more than five in one day, nor more than 10 in seven consecutive days.

Prairie Chicken.—Open from September 1 to October 15 of each year. Limit: Not more than five in one day, nor more than 10 in seven consecutive days. In Grant, Umatilla and Harney counties, closed at all times.

Sage Hen, Sage Cock.—Open from August 1 to November 1 of each year. Limit: Not more than five in one day, nor more than 10 in seven consecutive days.

Quail (Except Bob White Quail).—Open from October 15 to November 15 of each year. Limit: Not more than five in one day, nor more than 10 in seven consecutive days.

In Jackson and Josephine counties, open from October 15 to December 15 of each year. Limit in these counties, 10 in one day, and not more than 20 in seven consecutive days.

In Grant, Harney, Wheeler, Gilliam, Umatilla, Morrow and Malheur counties, closed until October 15, 1913, then open from October 15 to November 15 of each year. Limit in these counties, not more than five in one day, nor more than 10 in seven consecutive days.

Doves (Zona Macroura) or Wild Pigeons (Columba Fasciata).—Closed between January 1 and September 15 of each year.
