The question of greatest publie importance at present is the threatened railroad strike. A struggle for supremacy between the railroads and their employes, involving hampered transportation facilities, pecuniary losses to both parties and probable violence and bloodshed, should be avoided if possible. The strike situation is now one that involves all sections of the country directly or indirectly, and has become greater in scope than any contention that has heretofore tongues and other now imposarisen between the railroads and sible delicacies. their employes on the Pacific coast.

Of late years the strike feature of labor unions has gotten to be a powerful weapon in the hands of labor leaders, who wield it in many instances unscrupulously. The right and need of labor to organize is unquestioned, and, used legitimately, the power thus secured will have the support of the public. With the federation of labor unions, however, a political machine has been effected in the higher councils of the organizations that is fast robbing the rank and file of labor unions of their influence and initiative, and is, in many instances, plunging them into disastrous consequences. Also, it is no secret that officers in executive positions in labor organizations have become wealthy after a few years of rule during which they have been identified with strikes.
